

Another disaster, I fear. This lady has Von Willebrand's disease, Which was diagnosed late in life.


In 1981 she wished to have a pelvic floor repair, and I gave her a trial infusion of ten bags of Cryoprecipitate in order to monitor her Factor VIII response. The numbers of the ten bags of Cryoprecipitate used were as follows: 32507, 32504, 32518, 34242, 32511, 30843, 35092, 32494, 35113, 35112. She had a peculiar allergic reaction to the infusion and had to be admitted overnight.

After this episode she decided not to have her pelvic floor repair. In 1983 she was admitted with an acute G.I. bleed and was given an infusion of Factor VIII (batch no. HLA3020). A month later she got Non-A Non-B hepatitis, which has gone on to chronic active hepatitis. She is on steroids for this.

This year she has suffered mental deterioration, and CT scan has showed almost total atrophy of her frontal lobes. She is HIV-positive and the presumed clinical diagnosis is HIV encephalopathy. She has declined further investigation.

It must be presumed that she was infected either by the relevant batch of freeze-dried Factor VIII or by the Cryoprecipitate in 1981.

If you can identify the source of her infection, I'd be very interested to know the answer. So will she, because she is about to arrange an appointment to come and discuss the whole affair with me.
