Dr. John Bridges who looks after some of the very young children with haemoph; a, has asked me to write to you to enquire regarding the educational facilities a the Lord Mayor Treloar College.

I very much regret being unable to be present at the Symposium held during the month of April at which all my queries would have been answered. I am almost certain that I should be addressing this letter to the headmaster of the college and if this is so, I would be grateful if it could be passed on to him.

There are two haemophiliac boys in the family called GRO-A, one aged seven and one aged nine who come from a very poor social background and whose father, although a trained nurse, does not appear to recognise a severe haemarthrosis when it occurs. The educational and social services department here feel that the home background is unsuitable. The haemophilia is moderately severe with a frequent, spontaneous haemarthrosis affecting the knee-joints primarily. My query is - would the college accept these children as pupils, are they too young?

I would be grateful for any information that could be forwarded to me.
