I suspect you will have heard that this boy has recently developed serum hepatitis, which must be related to the regular Factor VIII he is receiving at home. We have seen him on several occasions with this and he remains unwell, nothing like his normal self. He is nauseated, with some vomiting, poor appetite and rather lethargic. His liver is considerably enlarged and of course he is markedly jaundiced.

When I saw him on Friday, together with Dr. Boulton, he had some pain and discomfort in the left ankle, which was thickened: he had some haematuria. We gave him two further bottles of Factor VIII. We have discussed the implications of GRO-B's diagnosis with Mrs. GRO-B and asked her to take extra precautions when injecting GRO-B. She has also been warned that it may well be several weeks or months before he is fully recovered. In the meantime we have arranged for him to have some home tuition.

I had the anticipated slight histrionics with Mrs. GRO-B: when they visited me today, but I must say that GRO-B appears a remarkably lively little chap.

Because of recent queries from the Central and Southern District Administration concerning the expense of buying commercial clotting factor concentrates, I feel that wherever possible we must initiate home therapy programmes on the basis of Cryoprecipitate. Mrs. GRO-B has a deep freeze, but is not sure of its temperature range. However, if this turns out to be satisfactory (and of course the B.T.S. will have to be satisfied with this) I think we should encourage her to continue on the basis of Cryoprecipitate at home, although we can get powdered concentrate for travel.

I have not made a further appointment, but have asked Mrs. GRO-B to bring GRO-B to Tropics on the next bleeding occasion so that I can be satisfied that a) she can needle properly, and b) that she is confident about re-constitution of Cryoprecipitate.
