Antihemophilic globulin concentrate (Factor VIII)

we spoke.

I sent CMO copies of minute dated 4 Jan and a letter to Dr D.P. Thomas about product licences for an American and an Austrian concentrate. Dr. Winter tells me that a licence for the former has been absurd and is likely to be issued in the near future.

Dr. Winter has submitted, using data from Dr R. Rugg, Haemophilia Centre, Bradford, that the annual total cost for treating haemophiliacs in U.K. might well run into several million £.

It therefore seems important for the Dept. to consider whether this concentrate should be bought centrally & issued only through haemophilia centres and hospitals. The rate of expenditure would obviously not be reached immediately & it is of course possible that the amounts available from the American source may be limited. Nevertheless because of the potential expense it is important to decide how this problem should be dealt with.

If you agree, I would then suggest that the Dept. might assemble an ad hoc group to discuss the matter. Members might be Dr R. Rugg and A.C. Pizzi, Haemophilia Centre, Bradford, Professor E.H. Blackburn, Royal Infirmary, Sheffield, Professor G.I.C. Ingram, St. Thomas' Hospital, London and a Scottish representative. I would suggest Professor A.S. Douglas of the Queen's University of Edinburgh as a suitable人选 who is Chairman of the Scottish Working Party on the production, laboratory and clinical evaluation of Factor VIII + Factor IX.

I shall send you a minute very soon concerning the request forwarded through Professor Blackburn that the Dept. should form a working party to consider the whole question of providing materials for the treatment of haemophilia-related disorders.

The question of the American concentrate should be given more urgent consideration than could be given by the proposed Working Party.

In view of the expense of import in materials the Dept. should have constantly in mind the need to develop our own sources in the U.K. haemophilia centres. 24.1.73
