LETTER FROM SPEYWOOD LABORATORIES LTD OFFERING TO FRACTIONATE PLASMA ON BEHALF OF THE NETS.

It has been agreed that the letter opposite at 53A should be dealt with officially although it was addressed to Mr Kanals (telephone conversation with MR D J Clark).

Letters on this and related topics have been dealt with in the past by referring to the UK's determination to abide by the MHO resolution on the advantages of the voluntary donor system or - more relevant in this case - the decision to aim for NHS self-sufficiency in blood products (examples at 42% and 49B).

The proposal by Speywood offers no solution to the problems of the NBTS. At present BPL can fractionate all the plasma it can get from Centres and it is generally felt that gearing up the NBTS to produce more plasma is going to be a bigger job than building up fractionating capacity at Elstree. Even if there was a large surplus of plasma awaiting fractionation, it would be difficult to defend publically a decision to send it to America to be fractionated. It would be a blow to national prestige and it might be difficult to convince the public that all the components were duly returned.

I suggest that rather than debate all Speywood's points we should reiterate the guiding principle of NHS self-sufficiency. To make too much of sending the plasma to America to be fractionated might be unwise since I understand that there is a possibility that Cutter will build plant in Europe.
