Dr George Miller (General Management- Consultants) and his assistant Mr. Gordon Wright (Production Management- Consultants) discussed with us late yesterday their conclusions about the "stop gap" programme which Tom Sutton asked me last Thursday to get on the move.

Dr Miller told us that he had concluded that with more than the first half of "stop gap" could be implemented unless land is acquired in addition to the present BPL site so that accommodation for the day out of the programme can be logically planned as a whole. I thought you would like to know this without delay.

You will recall that this need for land was foreseen in the original stop-gap plan in which it was proposed that certain activities would have to be moved to an adjacent site the open basement-area above beneath the architect's first proposal for the pilot chromatography laboratory. However, in that this proposal for the pilot laboratory was rejected as not in the first form presented by the architect, there is no doubt that additional land will be needed to allow the logical planning of the full stop gap programme.

I therefore hope that the Department will be able to make a decision in the very near future whether BPL should remain at Elstree and, if so, what parts of the latter Institute Estate should be acquired. 40/60  
reaching this decision: I hope the Department will give

due weight to the financial expenses in our comments  
on Tom Butler's minute on "Handling of the Trends  
Working Party Report."

There is also urgency about ~~for~~ a decision  
concerning the pilot laboratory.

A long hiatus at this stage will undoubtedly  
have an adverse effect upon staff morale in BPL which  
not unexpectedly has already been somewhat affected  
by the closure of the Institute.
