Suspension of LSE students confirmed

THE suspension penalties on two students at the London School of Economics were confirmed late last night.

After an eight-hour sitting, the Standing Committee of the Court of Governors announced that it unanimously affirmed the findings of the Board of Discipline that both Mr. Marshall Bloom and Mr. David Adelstein were guilty of disobedience to an instruction given by the director, Sir Sidney Caine.

About 1,000 students heard the announcement in the school's old theatre. There were cries of "disgraceful" when it was announced.

The two student leaders are suspended until the end of the summer term. Mr. Adelstein, aged 20, is president of the Students' Union, and Mr. Bloom, aged 22, is president of the Graduate Students' Association.

Earlier, several hundred students from the LSE and from seven other universities marched down Fleet Street to a protest meeting at Lincoln's Inn Fields.

Students from Birmingham, Surrey, Manchester, Leeds, Hull, Oxford, Southampton, Newcastle, Essex and York univer-

sities and from several colleges were among the marchers.

A letter was read to the students' meeting from Sir Sidney Caine.

Sir Sydney wrote: "I hope very much to see in the near future a more efficient system of consultation, together with the wider representation of students on the relevant school committees."

Mr. Peter Archer, Labour M.P. for Rowley Regis, said the students of the school believed something so fundamental ought to be properly represented to the public.

Some of the events of the past week had made him sad and some "flaming mad." These were the "pompous sweeping statements" made by people who had not even taken the trouble to find out what was happening.

Mr. Peter Watherston, president of the school's Students' Union, and his deputy, Mr. Alex Finer, yesterday issued a statement deploring remarks made by Mr. Dennis Howell, Joint Under-Secretary for Education and Science, who said that the ringleaders at the school were overseas students.
