An application for a grant of £24,815 has been received from Mr. E.S. Evans, FRCS of the Lord Mayor Treloar Trust, Lord Mayor Treloar College, Upper Froyle, Alton Hampshire.

Details of the application are attached. If you are unable to attend the next meeting of the Panel please let me have your comments on this application so that they may be reported to the Panel.

In July 1967, £10,000 was made available to the Lord Mayor Treloar Trust for a three-year investigation at the Lord Mayor Treloar College and at the Blood Coagulation Research Unit, Oxford of treatment of acute joint and muscle haemorrhage in haemophilia.

In January 1971, £15,000 was made available to the Lord Mayor Treloar Trust for the continuation for three years of the grant for research into haemophilia.

The attached application is for the continuation of this grant for a further three years.

A. PARTICULARS OF APPLICANT.

B. PARTICULARS OF APPLICATION.

- (a) The present grant of £25,000 covering three years research expires on 14th August 1974.
- (b) There are several projects in progress which ought to be extended over the next three years (see attached).
- (c) There are now 50 haemophiliacs at the College who are available for 36 weeks during the year. All of the research projects are those which could only be carried out in an establishment such as the Lord Mator Trelawy College where the boys are under continuous observation for long periods and where there is an organization set up for keeping accurate records.
- (d) The Governing Body of the Lord Mator Trelawy Trust are negotiating with the Wessex Regional Hospital Board the appointment of a Trust Medical Officer. Such an appointment would leave the Research Fellow entirely free to concentrate fully on Research. It will however be necessary for them to work in close co-operation clinically.
- (e) It is suggested that the present Research Fellow, Dr. Mainford, continues until August 1975 and that a new appointment is made w.e.f. 1st May 1975. This would enable the new Research Fellow to train under Dr. Mainford for three months and attend the Oxford Centre. He would then complete the remaining two years of the research programme.
- (f) The Lord Mator Trelawy Trust will provide partly furnished living accommodation. The Trust has itself subsidised the Research to the extent of £7360 since its inception. It has also allowed the General Committee of the National Fund for Research into Crippling Diseases the use of School and College premises for fund raising purposes. The Committee has been able to forward £500 to the Fund exclusively for these activities.

In assessing the salary costs, it has been assumed that the new appointment will be made on the maximum of the Senior Registrar Grade i.e. £4,450 p.a. now being paid to Dr. Rainford. No amount has been included to cover future salary awards as these could be offset if the new appointment is made on a lower incremental point.

Application is made for a grant of £24,000 to cover three years from August 1974 to August 1977.

APPLICATION FOR EXTENSION OF GRANT FOR

HAEMOPHILIA RESEARCH

The following research projects have been either completed or are in the process of completion or continuation by the Research Fellow appointed under a grant from the National Fund for Research into Crippling Diseases. A number of papers concerning these projects have been accepted for publication. The research programme submitted in November 1970 was as follows:

- Project 1 Completed and a paper concerning the work is being submitted for publication entitled "Plasma Cortisol Levels and the frequency of spontaneous haemorrhage in Haemophilia" (See Appendix I, Paper D).
- Project 2 Is being continued and expanded in co-operation with the Medical Research Council Rheumatism Research Unit, Taplow and the Haemophilia Research Unit at Oxford. (See Appendix II).
- Project 3 Abandoned because the immunoglobulin profiles were influenced by the replacement therapy that the boys were receiving.
- Project 4 A preliminary report was forwarded to Mr. Duncan Guthrie. A second report has been completed and will be forwarded within the next month. The Public Health Laboratory has asked that this investigation be continued for a further year because the advent of radio-immunoassay has thrown a completely new light on the previous findings.
- Project 5 A clinical trial has been completed and a paper accepted for publication (See Appendix I, Paper C). This trial has stimulated further thought for research. (See Appendix III, Note).
- Project 6 (See Appendix I, Paper A and B). It would appear that adrenocortical activity may have a profound effect in either preventing or promoting haemorrhage in different cases of haemophilia. (See Appendix I, Paper B), this research is to be continued.
- Project 7 Being continued.
