- 4. My father was a haemophiliac. I would say his condition was mild as he led a relatively normal life.
- 5. I do remember he often talked about Professor Ludlam he would see at a Haemophilia Centre at Edinburgh Royal Infirmary.
- 6. My father was infected with hepatitis C as a result of being given contaminated blood or blood products.
- 7. I do not know if my father was given any information or advice beforehand about the risks of being exposed to infection. My father was a very private person when it came to his haemophilia, he didn't like talking about it.
- 8. I do not know when or who told my father he had hepatitis C. I remember Dad rang me one day and told me about his diagnosis of hepatitis C. I didn't know what hepatitis C was. He did not make out that it was a serious condition. I do remember he said he had got hepatitis C when he had been given a bad batch of blood. He said no more than that. I did not know what hepatitis C was at that time.

9. I do not know if Dad was exposed to other infections from the blood products he received.

Section 5. Impact

- 11. The impact of contracting hepatitis C for my father ultimately cost him his life. I remember seeing my father in 2016. My mother and I met him and he got out of a taxi to meet us; he was a shadow of his former self. I remember feeling shocked at his physical appearance. He could only walk with the aid of two walking sticks. He was very thin and pale. My father was a stoic, proud man so I do not know of his mental state.
- 12. When my father was told in 2017 that he had terminal cancer of the liver as a result of him contracting hepatitis C he gave up on life. He attempted to take his own life with an overdose of prescribed medication on two occasions. He was eventually detained in a psychiatric hospital for a time.
- 13. I do not know if my father was offered or given any treatment for his hepatitis

 C. He did not discuss his condition with me at all.
- 14.1 do not know if there were any treatments available for my father's hepatitis C infection that he was not offered.
- 15.1 do not know if my father's infected status impacted upon his treatment for any other medical conditions or dental care.
