

Thursday is UN World AIDS Day. Here is one reason why that should be of concern to us all

IN early September, my father died.

With some justification, my mother, sister and myself, believe he was killed by the incompetency of the British government.

He was a severe haemophiliac - a condition in males which delays the clotting of the blood for significant periods - and he was infected by hideously contaminated blood products passed by the Department of Health as being fit for use in trying to control the condition.

Last week, *The Independent* broke the story that 12 British men had died from the debilitating liver disease hepatitis C, brought on by the infected blood products, my father was one of them.

Correctly the newspaper gave the mechanics of the situation and also clearly indicated that the haemophiliac families are far worse off than the Department of Health. But behind all these desperate medical reports is a family - full houses, fatherless and grandfatherless.

The Church also has suffered. Dad had always been a Stokes man. All his life he lived for the Church, in particular with his devotion to the Church. In 1988, when 54, the Archdiocese of Liverpool's Finance Department gave him that chance...

Labour of love

For three years he encountered a labour of love. Rather than 'the stench of the rat-race' he said, 'I now go into work and there's a crucifix and a picture of the Pope on the wall.'

But by 1991, Dad had become so undermined by his haemophilia that he left the Curial Offices once. Friday in early December to enter hospital for an operation, a hefty undertaking for a 54-year-old - and he never returned.

By late January his operation hadn't worked, the medics wondered why. They tested. Then they discovered that he had developed chronic cirrhosis of the liver caused by the Hepatitis C - the same virus as of the same viral strain as Cholera and Yellow Fever - and we were told that we'd lose him.

Now we've lost him. At only 59.

Dad's case is littered with irony. Haemophilia is a genetic disorder that affects male children. Dad was one of the haemophiliac brothers. The other two are well dead.

They didn't contract liver disease from the 'blood banks'. No, they got AIDS instead.

In the early 1980s AIDS and HIV arrived in the news reports - a dreadful connection was deduced that infected patients had prob-

by donated blood. They had and like lambs to the slaughter haemophiliacs like Dad had unwittingly been injecting themselves with it so as to stem the intense agony of pain from a blood disorder of a joint, in Dad it was his elbow and his knee, doesn't stop bleeding internally it callously erodes the bone.

Waited five years

For five years we waited to hear whether the death sentence had been passed on us. I cried myself to sleep at nights wondering which of the hundreds of hospital visits at Jam in the meantime, when I had gone along with Dad to keep him company, had administered the fatal injection.

That was how it was. In sheer pain, unable to sleep. Dad would simply ring the bell, like he was told to, ask them to get an injection ready and he'd

be there in 20 minutes for a cure all. Some cure all...

But Dad was lucky! In 1986, we discovered that Dad hadn't contracted HIV - heaven had been so merciful. We had prayed that his motivation to carry on made sense to us. But as I said, his other two poor suffering brothers, with wives, children and grandchildren too,

were so lucky.

The mental anguish was sheer hell. That was what you couldn't tell anyone because of the homophobia. We heard reports that neighbours in a street in Newcastle found out that the man at No 22 was haemophiliac - so they covered and stained his front lawn with AIDS flags.

I was watching TV in work one day, whilst a civil servant, and the newscaster was telling of how hundreds of haemophiliac families were demanding the government accepted responsibility.

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bility for the deaths of their loved ones.

Unbelievably the girl sitting next to me said: 'I hope they don't get a cent. They deserve to pay their dues.' They chose if they wanted to. If they want to be perverts then they must accept the consequences. If you ask me it's God's vengeance against the Church.'

Obviously because haemophilia begins in the womb and is another form of homosexuality. I still know the girl quite well and shared a Christmas drink with her last year. She's blissfully unaware of her tactlessness.

So for three years I went to see him. He wasn't going to die after all. Mum and Dad finally got to see him again. Dad witnessed two more grandsons born, one of whom was coming into the world. And he

was able to see me take my last breath.

Then it was all snatched away. And we still couldn't tell the truth. In early 1992 we were told his time was short. Our official line to all enquires was that he had cancer. The Archdiocese believed he had cancer.

There seemed little point in relaying what was really wrong with him every time anyone asked. Then in August this year another story hit. Dad had worsened considerably.

No transplant

Plans for a possible liver transplant had heartbreakingly, with his wife, been diagnosed with cancer after all - brought on directly by the liver condition.

I could hardly inform people

that Dad had got worse because he had developed cancer. Their obvious answer would have been:

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
