This is the yong lady whom I mentioned to you with Factor X1 deficiency, whose most recent level was 3% as part of our study. She is now aged 26, and was diagnosed in 1981 following a total colectomy for ulcerative colitis when she needed 12 units of whole blood. Other than this, she had no previous history of bleeding and had had no surgery.

Since that time she has had some minor operative procedures, such as a D&C and EUA, for which she has received FFP and developed an allergy to it. Because of this, when she had a small naevus removed from her arm she was treated with Factor XI enriched Factor IX concentrate.

She has recently got married and wishes to start a family but wants some advice about risks involved with the pregnancy and so on and, of course, what treatment she should have should she require an operative delivery which is quite a possibility in view of her previous abdominal surgery and the fact that she has an ileostomy. I would be most grateful if you could see her and advise. I enclose a copy of her family tree. Her husband, GRO-B , has no family history of a bleeding disorder but we have taken a sample for Factor X1 testing which I am forwarding to Angus under separate cover.
