5.	5. My father was a Haemophiliac and I remembe	r he used to go for re	egular blood								
	tests. I saw him taking his injections in front of m

6.	6. I believe that he started taking Factor VIII in o	or about 1980 and h	e was being								
	treated in the GRO-B at th	e time.									
7.	7. I believe that his blood was tested from 198	0 but he was never	told of the								
	possibility of contracting HIV from this. My mo-	ther has told me that	t in GRO-B he								
	was told that he had contracted HIV and this	had a devastating ef	fect on him.								
	Therefore I assume that he was given the infec	ted blood products a	t some point								
	between 1980 and 1983. I was only at the time	e so I can not remem	ber exactly.

Section 5. Impact of the Infe	<u>ction</u>	

- 12. Before my father was diagnosed with HIV and Hepatitis, I remember that we all used to go out together as a family. I went to air shows with him and the odd holiday to GRO-B and other outings. I would say that I had a happy younger childhood but also I also remember my parents started arguing more at that time but I didn't know why.
- 13. From the time my father retired he aged a lot very rapidly. He looked 60 or 70 years old when he did but he was only about very years old. His hair went really grey and he looked skinny and gaunt. He couldn't walk very well and had to use two walking sticks. He also used an electrical wheelchair sometimes.
- 14. In 1983 when I believe he was diagnosed, I was only about ROB years old and so my parents hid it from me until I was about ROB years old because he was basically on his deathbed. My father didn't want to discuss it with me but my mother told me what was going on. I think he had pneumonia and it was thought that he was about to die. He was bedbound and brought home from the hospital on a stretcher bed. He stayed in bed for months before he got out of bed again.
- 15.He stayed in the living room when his legs got so bad that he couldn't get upstairs anymore and we eventually moved from our house and into a bungalow because of this, around GRO-B
- 16. After his pneumonia death scare he used to just sit around and watch TV constantly. He was always at home but he didn't used to speak to me much. I felt that he lacked an interest in us all really. He never really got off his chair. He

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even used his wheelchair to get tea or food occasionally; otherwise my mum would do everything.

17.My father started taking AZT tablets which caused him to have very bad bleeds from his Haemophilia. I remember ambulances and paramedics were always coming to see him. I do not know if he was taking anything else as he did not like speaking about his illness and I was only young anyway.

- 19. His health progressively deteriorated throughout his illness and towards the end he was completely bed bound again. I think his HIV tablets may have slowed down his deterioration.
- 20. My father's social and private life was also heavily affected by his infections. He became very introverted because his social life effectively ended when he had the infections and people found out. Everyone assumed that he had AIDS and no one wanted to know him. He lost all his friends and he became depressed really. He never used to say much and we did not really talk.
- 21.He started going out GRO-B for a while but then even that stopped.
- 22.I think that he took all his feelings out on our family a lot. He treated my mother quite badly. She was effectively his nurse and he objected to her doing it. I think he was embarrassed about it.
- 23. My mother used to do everything for my father. She became his carer on top of all the housework. She used to help him with everything really, even showering. There were times she used to talk about leaving him because he would treat and speak to her horribly. He would not give my mother money or things that me and

- 30.1 think my father drove a wedge between us as a family. My GRO-B got kicked out of the house and then we never really spoke. It was only in my GRO-B that we reconnected.
- 31. There was a lot of stigma around HIV at the time and this also really affected us. We used to be very friendly with our next door neighbours and we used to socialise with them frequently. They found out about my father's infection and assumed he had AIDS. They cut us off completely.

- 33. It was due to this that I already had an inclination that something was not right when my mother eventually told me about my father's infection.
- 34. I moved out of the family house when I was rot go and live with my partner at the time. My father had a rule that I was not allowed anyone to stay over so I moved out. I moved back in when I was rot allowed same year that my father died.
- 35.I was too young to know any different life. I don't feel like I really had a GRO-B or a father. I do not know if things could have been different for me because I was so young. I felt alone and I had to figure things out for myself.

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- 36.I do not even want children now. This may be due to how I was treated and how I felt as a child. Maybe it had a subconscious effect on me, I do not know, but I have never really got everything off my chest and I am still affected by it.
- 37.I never told anyone about my father's infection. I only told my partners that he had Haemophilia and arthritis. I kept it all to myself and it was hard. My mother told me not to speak to people about it due to the reaction my father got from all the people close to him, so it was to safeguard me really.
- 38. Even at school I never told anyone about my father's infection. I always used to get into trouble at school and I was disruptive. I used to like having a laugh in lessons and sometimes played the role of the class clown. I don't know if this subconsciously had something to do with not getting any attention at home. I even used to drink alcohol a little as a teenager, I don't know if this was due to my father's illness and wanting to get away from it all.
- 39. After my O-Levels I went to work in GRO-B and ended up staying there for veas years. This was not what I wanted to do.
- 40.1 am not sure about the financial effects of my father's infection had; however, I know that he took voluntary redundancy. I think his work knew about his infection and they did not want to keep him on after he got infected. He was only about GRO-B when he retired.

Section 6. Treatment/care/support

- 41.1 believe that care or support should have been offered to help my mother look after my father. My mother used to do everything.
- 42. HIV was a disease that people didn't understand and even the doctors and nurses stayed away and did not want to come and help I think because of this. He did still see his GP however.

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43.1 don't think my father had counselling at that time and neither did I. My well being was never really taken into account and I believe counselling would have helped me, especially given my age at the time.

Section 7. Financial Assistance

44.1 do not know if my father ever received any financial support as a result of his infections.

Section 8. Other Issues

45. None of this should have happened to anyone and no one should have been infected. There should have been some kind of screening and people should have been made aware of what had happened as soon as it was known. It certainly should not have been kept a secret. What happened was unfair and hard for a lot of people. It affected many lives.
