Thank you for asking me to see this man. Apart from subconjunctival haemorrhage and his pretty well healed corneal abrasion, there is nothing to be concerned about here. I phoned Moorfield's and they told me that the x-ray of his left eye did not show any intraocular foreign body. We will therefore simply see him again after he has used Chloramphenicol twice a day for about a week.
