

5. My GRO-B has provided a statement with the details relating to the treatment my GRO-B received however I will summarise the important facts within my statement.

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ſ	My GRO-B was diagnosed in 1982 with Haemophilia A classed as severe with a clotting factor of 0.6% and Haemophilia B with a deficiency of 38.1% at about 18 months old GRO-B had shut GRO-B finger in a door and it would not stop bleeding. GRO-B was then treated with Cryoprecipitate to counter his low level of Factor VIII and deficiency of Factor IX (FIX). My GRO-B was advised not to have any more children. The Doctor was adamant that GRO-B was a carrier of the gene that caused haemophilia.								
7.	Until 1995, my GRO-B was treated at GRO-B under the								
	care of Dr Harry Baumer and Dr GRO-B GRO-B had also been seen by Dr GRO-B

8.	8. In 1995, we had moved house, to be nearer to GRO-B Hospital GRO-B as my wife and								
	were told that S would receive a much better service at GRO-B At GRO-B At GRO-B								
	came under the care of Dr GRO-B , Dr GRO-B Dr GRO-B and Clinical								
	Nurse Specialist, GRO-B								
9.	From the time GRO-B was diagnosed with haemophilia, GRO-B was given Factor VIII								
	concentrates and other blood products, as and when GROB needed them. Between 1982 and								
	1985, we believe the doctors administered non-heat treated blood products.								
	In 1985 as we were aware of the risks of AIDS, we requested S be tested for HIV. The result was negative. In 1988 when S was 7 years old, my GRO-B and I requested as a precaution be tested for HIV again. The result was positive it was heart-breaking. After the initial HIV test in 1985, my GRO-B received heat treated Factor VIII as this was considered safer.								
11	. My ско-в and I were given minimal advice of the risks of infection associated with receiving								
	blood products when we were at GRO-B Doctor Baumer was particularly unhelpful, his advice								
	about HIV was very brief and blunt and contained little or no information about the risk of								
	infection to others. I believe that Dr Baumer did not even know himself how S could have contracted HIV. It felt as if the doctors at GRO-B were shocked at my GRO- diagnosis.								
12	Most of the information we obtained about HIV was from our own research or the media. I do not believe that the information provided by Dr Baumer was adequate. My GRO-B S and I all found that the staff at GRO-B were much more helpful and humane in terms of how								

# ANONYMOUS they treated us. Dr GRO-B was particularly good. I found that we were treated more like human beings and less like guinea pigs.



- 14. In 1986, 1987 and 1988, my GRO-B was tested for Hepatitis B. GRO-B had been vaccinated against Hepatitis B and the all these tests returned negative.
- 15. We have seen from the medical records we have been able to obtain that, s was tested for HCV in 1997. This test was carried out without the consent or knowledge of my GRO-B or I. It is evident that although the medical staff at GRO-B were aware of my GRO-B HCV infection, we were not informed at the time GRO-B tested positive.
- 16. In 2001, S developed testicular cancer. It was at this point that S, myself and my GRO-B were all made aware of S HCV infection for the first time. We were told that due to my GRO-B infection, he would need a certain type of treatment.

### Section 3. Other Infections

17.I am aware that GRO-B received a letter in 2004 from the NHS stating that GRO-B was at risk of vCJD.

### Section 4. Consent.

18. Neither my GRO-B or I gave consent to the HCV tests that were carried out on S We were not even aware of the tests that were being carried out on GRO-B We had consented to S being tested for HIV as we requested those tests.

### Section 5. Impact

19. When my <sup>ско-в</sup> and I <u>were inf</u> ormed about <b>s</b> being infected with HIV, Dr Baumer advised
us not to mention it to S straight away. On the one hand, this could have been a positive
thing because if we were to tell GRO-B about GRO-B infection at that age GRO-B probably would not
have understood. There was a massive stigma attached to HIV because of the media
attention the infection was being given.
20.On the other hand, I also believe that the doctors were only looking out for themselves.
They were more concerned with their reputation than the care of my GRO-B. As parents, our
main concern was to ensure the safety of GRO-B At the time, GRO-B was a minor and GRO-B was
probably not capable of understanding the full ramifications of what being infected with HCV
and HIV meant.
21 S would just lie on the sofa every day when GRO-B was undergoing treatment for GRO-B HIV.
GRO-B daily routine would consist of GRO-B waking up in the morning, lying on the sofa because
of the sheer lack of energy, and then going back to bed again when it was time for bed.
This meant that S would often miss a lot of time at school. GRO-B physically could not do
anything. It was so hard to witness. A young GRO-B of GRO-B age should be able to play sports
and live an active lifestyle.
22.In 1988 when we were told about S HIV infection, we as parents did not truly
understand the full ramifications of the infection. The doctors should have provided us with
a lot more information.
23. S condition was so bad at one point; we thought see might pass away. It was so hard for
my <sup>GRO-B</sup> and I. We could not bear to witness it <sup>GRO-B</sup> mental state would steadily decline to

25.This infection led to S developing anorexia as ROB would be unable to eat and then
digest food. I cannot put into words how difficult this was to witness. The only positive was
that S would never really get a common cold.
26. The AZT was particularly bad for S developed haemorrhoids which were extremely
painful and led to a massive decrease in mental health. s suffered with an immense
amount of depression. The physical effect that impacted my GRO-B the most was the fatigue.
соuld not do anything.
27. My GRO-B and I were always concerned about the stigma associated with HIV. Most intelligent
and informed people would realise that S would have been infected with these viruses
through no fault of own. But in reality, the majority of people would say that S led a
horrendous lifestyle or that was GRO-B No one should be subjected to that kind
of treatment; especially when it is not their fault. This had a profound impact on all three of
our social lives as we could not leave the house. We also felt that we should keep this a
secret and not tell anyone.
28. In the small GRO-B where we lived, we hardly told anyone about S infection because of
the horrific stigma attached. We told a very small amount of people, because news would
travel fast where we lived and because of a few uneducated people, the wrong impression would be given about S.
29.We have not been able to go on a proper holiday because of the costs of travel insurance
and life insurance. A holiday would have just been too expensive for the family.
30 S would also have to wait a long time for GRO-B haemophilia treatment. This was mos
likely because of GRO-B HIV status. The staff at Plymouth hospital were horrendous. We were
not treated like humans, we were told to sit there and be quiet. When we tried to access
dental treatment for S the four doctors were dressed up like spacemen. All the
equipment was covered in plastic wrap. S was very frightened and GRO-B got the
impression that would infect the whole hospital.
31.The haematologist in Plymouth was of no help at all. They barely gave us any information
or help, without referring us to a specialist or anything.

32. Following this, the financial impact on our family was immense. We would have to travel

twenty five miles once a fortnight at least, to the hospital. This would sometimes be two or
three times a week.
33. The impact of the infections on S education was broad. GRO-B missed a lot of schooling from the late 80's through to the 90's. The majority of the absences would be because was too unwell as a result of the HIV infection. GRO-B did not even finish GRO-B education and my GRO-B and I would get visits from Education officers as they thought GRO-B was bunking off school. Even then, we had to keep S HIV status a secret because of the stigma attached to HIV.
Section 6. Treatment/Care/Support
34. We were not offered any kind of psychological support or counselling. We were offered no support from GRO-B at the time of the HIV diagnosis. We were offered a few types of alternative treatments at the GRO-B Hospital such as reflexology and massage therapy.  35. We had difficulty accessing the relevant treatments that S needed. He was offered Interferon treatment for HCV, around 2002. S had researched the medication at length and which course might be best for GRO-B GRO-B felt that given GRO-B liver was not too badly affected by the HCV infection at the time, GRO-B would wait until newer drugs became available GRO-B had to fight to receive the drug Harvoni in 2016. It was a lengthy process liaising with the hepatitis nurse GRO-B would often be waiting months for a response GRO-B was eventually referrered to see a professor at Plymouth, Derriford Hospital who agreed that S was a good candidate for the drug, giver GRO-B healthy lifestyle, the fact GRO-B didn't drink or smoke and would most likely adhere to the course of medication. It took several months before funding a GRO-B became available and the drug was prescribed.
Section 7. Financial Assistance  36. My GRO-B statement addresses this issue at length. But what I would like to say is that when we went through the HIV litigation with GRO-B, we had to sign a waiver of our rights in order to receive a sum of £23,000.

37. The financial support was no where near enough to help us with our needs. We struggled

for so long.	
Section 8. Other Issues	
38. It has been a constant struggle for S my GRO-B and I. The support we got from some	o
the medical professionals at gro-в was nowhere near enough and the way we were treate	ed
as a family was an absolute disgrace.	
39. This could have been so easily avoided if the people who were caring for s had do	
their job properly.
