Section 2. How Affected

5.	B had severe Haemophilia B, diagnosed at 18 months. He was under the care of Dr Savage at St Thomas' and Guy's Hospitals and he was treated with Factor IX (FIX) concentrate.
6.	No information was given to me, B or to any of our family at all about the risk of infection. None of our family were aware that B was at any risk.
7.	B was in his early twenties when he was told that he was infected with HIV a St Thomas' Hospital. He was told not to tell anybody and to go away and get or with his life. He was told that he probably had just three years to live. No information was provided at all to help him to understand and manage the infection. No information was given to him at that time about the risks of transmission and the risk to others.
8.	I am appalled about how B was told that he had HIV in such a blunt and uncaring manner. No preparation, counselling, advice and/or support was provided to him.
9.	Some years later, B was told that he was infected with HCV at St Thomas Hospital. He was left totally devastated and angry that, yet again, his world was blown apart.

10. I am not aware of B being infected with anything other than HIV and HCV.

Section 4. Consent

11.1 firmly believe that my brother was tested and treated without his knowledge, without his consent and without any adequate information at all. I believe that he

was used for the purposes of research and that he had no idea that any research was being carried out.

Section 5. Impact of the Infection

- 12. The impact of the infection on my brother's life was massive. It affected every area of his personal and working life. His illness and his physical and mental state, especially after the HIV diagnosis, presented him with serious changes and difficulties in getting and maintaining work. He turned to alcohol to escape the feelings of inadequacy and fear from the pressures of his infection and the social stigma that was attached to it all.
- because he knew he was going to die and would have to leave them.

 B tried to appear as if he was coping but he was not. He really needed help but never got it. He could not just meet girls like other young men as there was never a right time to tell them he was infected with HIV and it was always going to be many years before that right time presented itself. He was unable to have a relationship during the prime of his life. He felt inadequate as a man. He felt worthless and useless as he was often not able to work either. He felt that he was on the outside of society, always hiding everything because of his health status and the stigma attached to it.
- 14. My brother wasn't able to pursue any form of career (he was a GRO-B when diagnosed with HIV). He never did any further educational courses or study due to his illness and status. It was impossible for him. He worked at times but, again, his infections and the resulting issues with his physical health caused him problems and got in the way. This had a huge financial impact on his whole life. He could not get mortgages or insurance. When he had his own family later in life he felt upset and inadequate. He struggled to provide for them financially whilst he was alive and he knew that he would not be able to when the

	inevitable happened and he died. This bothered him greatly as every man wants
	to take care of his loved ones. B could not get any local treatment for his
	medical and dental needs and always had to attend St Thomas' or Guy's.
15	It all had a massive mental and physical impact on my brother. He was never the
	same person. After being told he was infected with HIV, B knew he had to
	live a lie. He felt alienated from others and very alone, alone and living with the
	ticking time bomb that a horrendous death would come to him without warning at
	any time. I cannot find enough words or adequate words to describe the total
	devastation and change I saw in my brother.
16	I didn't tell anyone about it for a long time and shut myself off from it emotionally.
	I pretended for years it wasn't happening because the fear and stigma
	associated with HIV/AIDs was so bad at that time. I eventually told just one
	friend but it wasn't for very many more years later (and when I was a lot older)
	that I confided in just a few trusted friends. It was the same for my whole family.
	My mum never even told her own parents. Our parents were both devastated.
	My mum will talk about it now but my dad never ever did. It was a family secret.
	It was always there in the back of my mind although I tried to ignore it as much
	as possible. It is still a huge worry for me to this day as I fear a negative impact
	on my brother's daughter should someone find out about it. I believe that she
	would be hurt by the stigma that still exists and so it all still goes on. No one is
	ever really free of it. None of our family were given any support or counselling.
	My brother never really spoke to me about it all. It shattered all our lives.
17	.My brother's physical health deteriorated and he was left without any treatment
	for either HIV or HCV. B developed liver cirrhosis and had to have his spleen
	removed.

18	B lost faith in the medical profession. He	e had no treatment for h	IV or HCV. I	
	do not believe that B was ever offered	counselling or support.	No one ever	
	contacted me to offer any support or counselling.			

Section 7. Financial Assistance

19.1 am not aware of what my brother's financial situation was and am unable to comment in relation to the assistance he received from the trusts and funds.

Section 8. Other Issues

20.1 find it absolutely abhorrent that my brother and my family trusted in the doctors, medical staff and centres, the NHS and the drug companies in the hope of better health and a better life for my brother when it actually led instead to him being given horrendous infections that ruined his life. The stigma attached to his infections given by the treatment and the devastation and impact upon him living with a constant death sentence hanging over his head and never knowing what would come next, ultimately led to his early death. The fact that he was used for research and tested like some lab rat is beyond comprehension. Whilst this was all going on, no support for him or any of us was given. Words could not convey how deep the anger goes as this whole situation is absolutely outrageous and should never have happened.
