WRITTEN STATEMENT OF DEBORAH JANE BIGGS

I provide this statement in response to a request under Rule 9 of the Inquiry Rules 2006 dated 28 July 2020.

I, Deborah Jane Biggs, will say as follows: -

Section 1. Introduction

- 1. My name is Deborah Jane Biggs (previously Lee and maiden name Smith). My date of birth is GRO-C 1962 and my address is GRO-C GRO-C I am a live-in warden at a residential complex. I have one adult son and a grandson.
- I qualified as a nurse in 1984 after 3 years training and worked on a female medical ward at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital, Kings Lynn for approximately 2 years. I took a career break to look after my 2 disabled step daughters and then I became pregnant with my son. My marriage broke up shortly after he was born, so I went into the caring profession when he was 8 months old.

- I intend to speak about my infection with the Hepatitis C virus (HCV), which I believe I contracted as a result of being given a blood transfusion after an emergency caesarean section in 1991.
- 4. In particular, I intend to discuss the nature of my illness, how the illness affected me, the treatment that I received and the impact it had on my life.
- 5. I confirm that I have chosen not to be legally represented and that I am happy for the Inquiry team to assist me with my statement.

Section 2. How Infected

- 6. I gave birth to my son in GRO-C 1991 and had to have an emergency caesarean section at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital, Kings Lynn.
- 7. I was told after the procedure that I had been given a blood transfusion and I have always believed this to be the case, yet it is not stated on my medical records.
- 8. My sister was also informed that I had been given a blood transfusion.
- I was not surprised I required a blood transfusion, because of the amount of blood I lost.
- I think I was kept in hospital for 7 or 8 days after the birth and then I threatened to discharge myself.
- 11. I also ended up with a very nasty wound infection after the caesarean. I am not sure if this was linked to the infected blood. This was not on my medical records either, but I had to visit a district nurse for a number of weeks for the wound to be packed. I was also prescribed various courses of antibiotics to clear the infection.

- 12. When my son was 3 years old I had to go into hospital for an appendectomy. Again, this was at the Queen Elizabeth. I do not think I had any transfusions, but I am not 100% sure.
- 13. I had my ears pierced at the age of 5 and have one small tattoo, but both were carried out at registered places in the UK.
- 14. In July 2016 I went to my GP because I was experiencing problems with my knee. I also explained that I was very lethargic, tired all the time and was having hot flushes – these were not menopausal. I thought I might be diabetic.
- 15. The GP took various blood tests and found that I had raised liver enzymes. He explained that my liver function was not right and sent me for further tests.
- 16. Once the test results were received, the GP diagnosed me with HCV. I recall being very shocked and in a daze. I was referred onto the liver specialist, Dr Douds at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital.
- 17. He took further blood tests to find out the genotype, which I think was 3.
- 18. Dr Douds explained how to manage the virus, but I was living alone at this point so there was little risk of transmission. My nursing background helped me to minimise any risk and I knew I had to be careful with bodily fluids.

Section 3. Other Infections

I have not contracted any infection other than HCV as a result of being given contaminated blood.

Section 4. Consent

20. I am not aware of being treated or tested without consent. I always found that medical professionals kept me informed with the tests they were doing,

Section 5. Impact

- 21. My infection with HCV explained the hot flushes and constant tiredness that I was experiencing.
- 22. I was very depressed at the time, but not to the point where I felt that I required medical help. I am a firm believer in self-healing.
- 23. Dr Douds referred me to Addenbrookes Hospital. I was seen in December 2016 for a fibro scan, which showed advanced fibrosis and cirrhosis of the liver.
- 24. I was prioritised for treatment due to the extent of liver damage and it commenced in April 2017. I could have started the treatment in December 2016, but the nurse asked if I wanted to wait for the new treatment that did not involve any injections, so I did.
- 25. It was a 12-week course of Sofosbuvir and involved 6 trips to Addenbrookes for regular blood tests and to pick up the medication. I took the tablets daily.
- 26. I recall the nurse saying how expensive the tablets were.
- 27. I had several nasty headaches whilst on the treatment and had blemishes on the skin. The headaches were throbbing and occurred most days, but it was not anything I could not cope with. I used to take paracetamol to relieve the pain.
- 28. I no longer experience the headaches now that I have finished the treatment.

- 29. I was told that I had a very high viral load, but the treatment was a success and I am now clear of the virus.
- 30. My life expectancy is not what it should be, because of the liver cirrhosis. It is something I just have to live with.
- 31. I still get tired in the afternoons, but not as much as I did before the treatment.
- 32. I do not drink alcohol now because of the damage HCV has caused to my liver, neither can I take ibuprofen. I have never been a heavy drinker, but did enjoy a drink socially.
- 33. I do not put myself in situations where I have to explain to others why I do not drink, by not going out.
- 34. None of my family realise the extent of the damage caused by HCV. I do not like to talk about it because it makes me feel dirty and I do not want to burden them.
- 35. I told my employers straight away about the diagnosis, but they have always been very good and I was able to manage my work around the treatment and various appointments.
- 36. I am on salary pay, so the infection had no effect on my income.
- 37. The only financial loss I suffered was the expense of travelling to Addenbrookes on a regular basis.

Section 6. Treatment/Care/Support

38. Once it was discovered that I had HCV, the NHS did a marvellous job throughout and I have no complaints.

- 39. I had the same specialist nurse at Addenbrookes and she was always very good.
- 40. Now that I have been discharged I see Dr Douds annually for numerous blood tests and a scan to monitor the state of my liver. Its condition has not changed, but I have not asked any further questions.
- 41. I have not sought counselling or psychological support.

Section 7. Financial Assistance

- 42. I was advised at all stages of my diagnosis and treatment to make an application with the Skipton Trust.
- 43. My application was refused in 2016 on the grounds that there is no reference to a blood transfusion on my medical records.

Section 8. Other Issues

- 44. I have nothing but praise for the NHS since I was diagnosed with HCV.
- 45. I feel rather unlucky to have been infected in 1991 as it was not long before blood started to be screened and heat treated.
- 46. I am infuriated that the infection was not discovered sooner, because I was a blood donor at Bury St Edmunds whilst training to be a nurse.
