6. I wish to rely on S and my husband's statements for part of this section.				
7. s was always a very contented baby he slept well from day one and rarely woke during the night. He grew into childhood equally contented and				
had a good relationship with both myself and my husband. He had a natural curiosity and was an early walker at ten months. He learnt easily and was				
reading before he started school. Despite many visits to the hospital for				
treatment for bleeds he was a happy child with a wide circle of friends.				
However during his teenage years he became subdued and lethargic. His				
relationship with his father went downhill rapidly and he was diagnosed with				
depression when he was about GRO-Byears old.				
8. When S was about or GRO-B old I was travelling back and to				
from the G.P with him. He had bumped his mouth and there was a slight				
bleed. This did not get any better and my husband and I went to the local				
hospital and from there S and myself were sent in an ambulance to GRO-B				
GRO-B while my husband followed in the car. From here

a. s was diagnosed with Haemophilia B.

c. When we returned home s was under the care of doctors and

d. Either at his first or subsequent treatments in the years to follow he				
was infected with both Hepatitis B and Hepatitis C. We were				
informed of him having had Hepatitis B after he had it and also				
cleared it.				

e. I believe the infection with Hepatitis C occurred in his late teens or
early twenties, but S didn't tell us until in or about late
2018/early 2019 that he was also infected with Hepatitis C.
Section 3. Other infections
9. As stated above S told my husband and I that he had also had Hepatitis C and Glandular Fever. Nobody had ever told us of either infection, I now wonder whether he had Glandular Fever at aged GRO-B and it was misdiagnosed as depression.
10.I rang GRO-B at some time in GRO-B On the GRO-B
GRO-B I received a letter from him answering my query. By this time I had graduated from the GRO-B and joined the Institute of GRO-B as an associate
member where I became aware of the risks of HIV infection and needed to
know if s 's immune system had been compromised. S had in fact
not been tested at this time. We received another letter, a year later, dated the
GRO-B telling us that s had now been tested and he was
negative for HTLV III (the AIDS virus). This was followed by another exact
copy of the above letter but it was dated the GRO-B
Section 4. Consent
11.When s was a child we gave consent for treatment when it was necessary to stop a bleed.
12. We were not told initially of the risk of infections that were associated with clotting products.
13. Once we knew the possible risks of infections we told doctors that unless absolutely necessary we were not happy to let shave too many treatments. This led to him not being able to play football or any other contact sports. We took him swimming instead to give an outlet to his need to be active and encouraged him to compete in sports days at school, which he thoroughly enjoyed because he excelled at running.

14. As an adult s decided when to actively give himself treatment. Now that he uses recombinant Factor IX he is more likely to use it prophylactically.
Section 5. Impact
15. The mental effects were enormous on S His main worry throughout his teenage years was whether he would be infected with HIV, but he internalised this. My husband and I never discussed this with him, he found out about the possibility himself and worried about it.
16. From my husband's statement it can be seen that we really had to battle to get heat treated Factor IX. Please refer to his statement in this regard.
17 s always felt different but when he discovered the nature of possible infections he avoided close friendships.
18.I am so glad that we kept the fact that S had haemophilia to ourselves. I remember having a conversation with a close friend I had told about haemophilia. This was when HIV was all over the news. She asked me what I would do if people knew that S was a haemophiliac and could get HIV. I said that I would not tell them to protect him from gossip such was the stigma.
19. Despite S being very bright and finding learning relatively easy all the worry he had come to bear had a devastating effect during the sixth form. He couldn't concentrate for most of the time and did really badly at A-levels. This made him feel like a failure and even when he eventually succeeded in getting three A-levels he had to go through a clearing process to find a place at University. His self-esteem was really low. Despite all this and changing courses from economics to psychology part way through he ended up with an honours degree (2:1) and ultimately further study enabled him to achieve an GRO-B and now works as a GRO-B
20.1 went back to teaching when S was GRO-B but only on a supply basis. This meant temporary work filling in for absences in various schools. This

enabled me to work a day or two at a time or turn down any job if it did not fit in with hospital visits.

Section 6. Treatment/Care/Support

21.As s had cleared both Hepatitis B and Hepatitis C himself before we had knowledge of either Infection no treatment was given. He was given psychological support for depression but no one linked this with the fact that he was worried about infection. We eventually paid £11,000 to have him treated privately where he was given intensive CBT (cognitive behavioural therapy) which did work and allowed him to get his life back on track.
