3 **SIR BRIAN LANGSTAFF:** Our next witness is to be known as  
4 Mrs C. I make an individual restriction order in the  
5 same terms as I made earlier. Let me just set them  
6 out.

7 It is ordered that the name and address of  
8 witness W2687 (we shall know her as Mrs C), the name  
9 of her son who died, the name of any other member of  
10 her family, and any other identifying information such  
11 as the witness's image or a description of her  
12 appearance, cannot be disclosed or published in any  
13 form unless express permission is given by me or by  
14 the solicitor to the Inquiry acting on my behalf.

15 Witness W2687 must be referred to only as  
16 "Mrs C". The order remains in force for the duration  
17 of the Inquiry and at all times thereafter unless  
18 otherwise ordered. I may vary or revoke the order by  
19 making a further order during the course of the  
20 Inquiry.

21 Mrs C.

22 **MRS C, affirmed**

23 **Questioned by MS RICHARDS**

24 Q. You're here to give evidence with the support of your  
25 husband about your son, S?

1 **A. Yes.**

2 Q. You're going to use his name in your evidence because  
3 it would be very hard for you to talk about him  
4 without naming him but the effect of the restriction  
5 order is that nobody can publish or disclose or pass  
6 on or report that name.

7 **A. Yes.**

8 Q. This I know is the first time you have spoken outside  
9 of your immediate family about what's happened?

10 **A. Yes.**

11 Q. If you need a break at any time please don't hesitate  
12 to tell us.

13 **A. Thank you.**

14 Q. So S was born in 1978?

15 **A. Yes.**

16 Q. He was diagnosed almost immediately I understand with  
17 haemophilia A?

18 **A. He was, yes.**

19 Q. His haemophilia was classed as severe?

20 **A. It was, yes.**

21 Q. One of your older children had also very recently at  
22 that point been diagnosed haemophilia whilst you were  
23 pregnant with S?

24 **A. Yes, we found out when I was six months' pregnant with**  
25 **S.**

1 Q. But that was only after a prolonged period of time,  
2 a distressing period of time, in which your other son  
3 had bruising and swelling and you were being accused  
4 or suspected of having injured him?

5 **A. I was, yes.**

6 Q. But after some 11 months or so, your eldest son was  
7 diagnosed with severe haemophilia?

8 **A. Yes.**

9 Q. And so S's diagnosis was picked up at birth?

10 **A. Straight away, yes.**

11 Q. I think when he was little, you were very conscious of  
12 his condition?

13 **A. Yes.**

14 Q. You used to wrap him in cotton wool?

15 **A. I was always frightened for anything to happen because**  
16 **of my other son, I'd seen what had happened. So he**  
17 **didn't learn to walk until he was two and that was**  
18 **when he was in the hospital having treatment and the**  
19 **physiotherapist got him walking, but that was purely**  
20 **because I didn't really let him go about very much**  
21 **because I was frightened. In them days they used to**  
22 **say they padded a play pen for him and my other son**  
23 **and that's like all cotton wool so they couldn't get**  
24 **hurt. So I think I restricted him from walking,**  
25 **actually.**

1 Q. But he did learn to walk.

2 **A. He did.**

3 Q. You've described him as a very easy child, a lovely  
4 chubby boy?

5 **A. He was, yes.**

6 Q. Did he as a baby need any treatment for his  
7 haemophilia?

8 **A. Not for the first, I would say he had his first**  
9 **treatment when he was about 18 months.**

10 Q. That was when you were on a trip somewhere to visit  
11 a relative?

12 **A. Yes, we was on the trip to go and see my sister and he**  
13 **was sitting on my knee and it was an all-night coach**  
14 **journey but by the time we got off the coach he didn't**  
15 **want to move his arm. It wasn't swollen or anything**  
16 **but you could see he just didn't want you to touch it**  
17 **or anything. So we had to -- I took him to the**  
18 **hospital in Burnley and they then, I don't think they**  
19 **knew much about haemophilia, but they contacted the**  
20 **hospital in Charing Cross where we used to attend and**  
21 **they told them what to do and to give him his**  
22 **Factor VIII.**

23 Q. Was it cryoprecipitate he was given at that stage?

24 **A. At that stage, yes, it was.**

25 Q. After that he ended up having to go to the hospital

1 fairly regularly to receive, at that stage,  
 2 cryoprecipitate?  
 3 **A. That's right yes.**  
 4 Q. And he didn't like it did he?  
 5 **A. No, he didn't.**  
 6 Q. You'd have to wrap him up and hold him down, the  
 7 family.  
 8 **A. Yes, and it used to take quite a long while for it to**  
 9 **go in as well, so it was quite difficult with him.**  
 10 Q. So the point in time came, I think you recalled in  
 11 your statement, around 1983 when his treatment changed  
 12 from cryoprecipitate to what you were told were  
 13 Factor VIII products.  
 14 **A. Factor VIII, yes.**  
 15 Q. Who would administer the Factor VIII to him?  
 16 **A. At first before I learnt how to do it, we used to go**  
 17 **to the hospital and they would do it, but then**  
 18 **I practised with one of the doctors used to let me**  
 19 **practice on him. First, it was with an orange and**  
 20 **then it was him until I learnt, and we were told it**  
 21 **was a brilliant thing because we could take the**  
 22 **treatment home and keep it in the fridge, so because**  
 23 **the boys used to have quite a lot of bleeds, they used**  
 24 **to say that we could give them the Factor VIII**  
 25 **immediately so it didn't get as bad, so that's what we**

1 **clinic there and she told me to come up and what she**  
 2 **would do is see if the dentist could take it out. We**  
 3 **got to the hospital and they called the dentist down.**  
 4 **When she did come down, she come in a space-suit and**  
 5 **it's like she didn't want to touch the ...**  
 6 **She said that it would fall out eventually. So**  
 7 **I said to her it wouldn't because this had been going**  
 8 **on for a couple of weeks. I said his gums is too --**  
 9 **I was trying to show it to her but she didn't want to**  
 10 **come close and she certainly didn't want to put her**  
 11 **hands by his mouth, so then the doctor said to her**  
 12 **that they needed to take it out. It wouldn't take --**  
 13 **because it was so loose so that she took him away, and**  
 14 **I said to the doctor what is going on because I didn't**  
 15 **understand and she took me in a room. That is when**  
 16 **she give me blue plastic bottle and a box of gloves**  
 17 **and she told me that the boys had been tested for HIV.**  
 18 **I didn't know what she was talking about and she said**  
 19 **that they'd tested positive and in future when I give**  
 20 **them their Factor VIII I had to wear gloves and use**  
 21 **the blue plastic bottle to put them in.**  
 22 **I said to her, because I'd seen how the dentist**  
 23 **was reacting, "but what about my other children", and**  
 24 **she just said to me she didn't know and then sent me**  
 25 **home and that's how it was.**

1 **did.**  
 2 Q. So you welcomed it as something that would make life  
 3 easier in terms of your ability to treat your boys?  
 4 **A. Exactly.**  
 5 Q. Were you given any warnings about the Factor VIII  
 6 products?  
 7 **A. No, I was just told it was an amazing thing and, in my**  
 8 **head, it did seem that way because when we used to go**  
 9 **to the hospital and it was cryo, you would go and**  
 10 **you'd wait to see the doctor, then the doctor would**  
 11 **bring the stuff down, then you had to wait again and**  
 12 **the cryo used to take quite a long time to go in as**  
 13 **well, so this was a lot better.**  
 14 Q. Was there ever any discussion with you about the  
 15 particular Factor VIII products that were being used  
 16 or any differences between different kinds of  
 17 Factor VIII products?  
 18 **A. No.**  
 19 Q. A year or two, I think, after he'd started on the  
 20 Factor VIIIs he developed a problem with a milk tooth.  
 21 Can you recall what happened?  
 22 **A. It got very wobbly and it was bleeding but his gum**  
 23 **swelled round it so it wouldn't fall out. So I phoned**  
 24 **up the hospital. We used to have to go to the**  
 25 **haematology unit because they never had a haemophilia**

1 Q. So you'd gone for what you thought was routine dental  
 2 treatment essentially to deal with the swelling that  
 3 had arisen around S's tooth?  
 4 **A. Yes.**  
 5 Q. The dentist had come and you understood that there was  
 6 something strange, something odd going on because of  
 7 the way the dentist was clothed, you described it as  
 8 a space suit, the dentist had a mask on, and the  
 9 dentist was you thought very obviously reluctant even  
 10 to touch S.  
 11 **A. Yes.**  
 12 Q. That's how you were told by the doctor who was there  
 13 that your two boys, including S, were HIV positive.  
 14 **A. Yes.**  
 15 Q. You've described being given the blue plastic bottle  
 16 and plastic gloves.  
 17 **A. Yes.**  
 18 Q. You were told that that was how you should administer  
 19 Factor VIII in future to the boys?  
 20 **A. Yes.**  
 21 Q. Did the doctor tell you what HIV was?  
 22 **A. No.**  
 23 Q. Did the doctor tell you anything about the connection  
 24 between HIV and AIDS?  
 25 **A. No, she didn't but then later on in them days there**

1 was a lot coming on on the news but then they were  
 2 saying it was drug takers, gay people that were  
 3 getting it, and it was horrible actually at that time.  
 4 It was really horrible. But to be honest, I don't  
 5 know, I think I shut it out of my mind. I just  
 6 didn't -- these two little boys, I just didn't accept  
 7 what they were saying.

8 Q. S was at the time we're describing seven years old?

9 A. He was six going on seven.

10 Q. And you weren't I think given any information about  
 11 what the longer term prognosis would be for either of  
 12 them?

13 A. No.

14 Q. You were particularly concerned for a whole range of  
 15 reasons but you had a baby at home.

16 A. Yes.

17 Q. And you asked about the risks of infection and what  
 18 you should do in relation to any of your other  
 19 children and the only answer you got was that --

20 A. That she didn't know.

21 Q. Did you know that your boys were going to be tested  
 22 for HIV?

23 A. No.

24 Q. Did you ever receive anything in writing about the  
 25 diagnosis of HIV from the hospital after that?

1 A. No.

2 Q. So it was a bottle, gloves and "I don't know".

3 A. Yes, and then later, I think about a week later, my GP  
 4 turned up at my door. He had a lady with him.

5 I think she must have been something to do with  
 6 education because it was about, they would come and  
 7 they said to me they had to go to the boys' school to  
 8 let them know that they had been tested HIV and that  
 9 was all I heard after that.

10 Q. You didn't understand why the school needed to be  
 11 informed but, in fact, the school treated the boys and  
 12 you okay?

13 A. They didn't treat us any different, no.

14 Q. I think your immediate reaction on being told the news  
 15 at the hospital in the way you've described, you went  
 16 to see your sister in a state of shock and you called  
 17 your husband?

18 A. I did because I didn't know what to do, so I run to my  
 19 sister -- she is the only one I actually told, to be  
 20 honest, and then we phoned my husband and he come  
 21 home. My sister she was shocked but even she didn't  
 22 actually know what this meant.

23 Q. What you said in your statement at that point is you  
 24 just didn't understand what was meant by the diagnosis  
 25 that you had been given.

1 A. No.

2 Q. You've described how you became aware from stuff that  
 3 was on TV or in the newspapers about AIDS but you  
 4 didn't really associate that with what was happening  
 5 to your children.

6 A. No, I didn't.

7 Q. Your children were children with haemophilia who had  
 8 been treated by the National Health Service and you  
 9 couldn't make the correlation.

10 A. No.

11 Q. I think you were told by your sister or a friend about  
 12 an article in the newspaper?

13 A. My sister phoned me up and she said that her neighbour  
 14 had bought a paper, the Daily Star, and that in it it  
 15 was saying that there was three boys, two brothers  
 16 have got AIDS in the hospital that my children attend  
 17 to. I knew that there was only three haemophiliacs in  
 18 that hospital. It might seem silly but it was true,  
 19 there was only three boys there, my two and another  
 20 little boy, so I knew they were talking about my sons  
 21 so I went to the hospital to ask them what was it  
 22 about and the doctor said to me that she wasn't sure  
 23 who had leaked the news out but they were trying to  
 24 find out, but it wasn't AIDS, it was HIV that my sons  
 25 had.

1 Q. I am going to ask to be put up on the screen in front  
 2 of you a newspaper article from around that time,  
 3 2687006, please, Paul. Are you able to highlight the  
 4 top left-hand article. Thank you.

5 So this is from a newspaper, The Gazette, we've  
 6 also got the Daily Star article that you referred to  
 7 but they say the same thing. If we just look at this  
 8 briefly together, please, Mrs C.

9 So it talks about three boys with a deadly virus  
 10 in hospital. It says the children do not necessarily  
 11 have the killer disease AIDS but experts say that  
 12 about 1 in 10 people found with the virus later  
 13 develop the disease and that because of their low  
 14 resistance to infections haemophiliacs stand a higher  
 15 than average chance of catching the disease.

Had you been told any of that by the hospital?

17 A. No.

18 Q. The higher chance of HIV turning to AIDS because of --

19 A. I've only just -- when they sent me this paper,  
 20 I think it was last week, I only saw it then. So  
 21 I wasn't aware of it, no.

22 Q. The hospital hadn't told you that?

23 A. No.

24 Q. Then if we just read on down it says:

"The parents of the children know of the risks

- 1 to their children."  
 2 Had the risks ever been explained to you?  
 3 **A. No.**  
 4 Q. Then a spokesman for the Northwest Thames Regional  
 5 Health Authority says:  
 6 "They have been informed about the positive  
 7 tests. They are being counselled by senior doctors  
 8 and the three boys are being monitored very closely."  
 9 Were you counselled by senior doctors?  
 10 **A. No, I was not.**  
 11 Q. Do you recall whether the boys were being closely  
 12 monitored at the hospital?  
 13 **A. Well, we used to go to -- we actually did go to the**  
 14 **hospital a lot because we used to go and have their**  
 15 **treatment done there so we was at the hospital a lot,**  
 16 **but I don't know if they was being monitored closely**  
 17 **for this.**  
 18 Q. You can take that down, thanks, Paul.  
 19 In 1986, the boys' care was transferred to  
 20 St Thomas' Hospital?  
 21 **A. Yes.**  
 22 Q. The haemophilia care was under the care of Dr Savidge  
 23 there?  
 24 **A. Yes.**  
 25 Q. Then in terms of the HIV infection under the care of

- 1 Q. What can you recall about that discussion?  
 2 **A. We explained what was the matter with them. First of**  
 3 **all, they just went very quiet and then we explained**  
 4 **that when they cut theirself they had to be careful**  
 5 **and to keep it covered.**  
 6 **Maybe I didn't speak about it too much because,**  
 7 **to be honest with you, it was bad enough me knowing**  
 8 **without telling them. At that point they seemed quite**  
 9 **healthy and maybe in my head I thought this isn't**  
 10 **really happening anyway, so we didn't go in any big**  
 11 **detail about it.**  
 12 **Later on, when I looked at S's diaries, he does**  
 13 **make a thing that he knew there was something because**  
 14 **I used to treat them different. When they went out,**  
 15 **I'd make sure they had scarves and stuff on, whereas**  
 16 **with my other children I didn't used to; so,**  
 17 **obviously, they were all aware but they never actually**  
 18 **said anything about it.**  
 19 Q. You have described in your statement how they  
 20 really -- they were quiet on receiving the news?  
 21 **A. Yes.**  
 22 Q. You weren't sure how much they understood?  
 23 **A. No.**  
 24 Q. Were you ever given any help or support or advice  
 25 about how to tell them or how to support them?

14

- 1 Dr O'Doherty?  
 2 **A. Yes.**  
 3 Q. Around this time it was suggested to you by the  
 4 hospital, I don't know if it was Charing Cross or  
 5 St Thomas' hospital, that you should tell the boys --  
 6 **A. Yes.**  
 7 Q. -- that they had HIV.  
 8 **A. Yes, they were very keen for us to tell them, but my**  
 9 **two children was only seven and eight. I just didn't**  
 10 **think that I could tell them that, so we didn't. We**  
 11 **eventually told them when I think S was 12 or 13 --**  
 12 **sorry.**  
 13 Q. That's all right, no, no. You can say S's name.  
 14 **A. My other son was 14 and that's when we told them.**  
 15 Q. I think what you said in your statement is the  
 16 hospital kept telling you from day 1 you should tell  
 17 them but you couldn't see, given their young age, why  
 18 they should and, again, when they got to 11 or 12 the  
 19 hospital were saying you should tell them but again  
 20 you thought that was too young?  
 21 **A. I did, yes.**  
 22 Q. Eventually you told them, and focusing for present  
 23 purposes on S, he was 13 or 14 years old?  
 24 **A. He was about 13 and we told them; we told them both**  
 25 **together, actually.**

16

- 1 **A. No.**  
 2 Q. When S was about 11 years old, he was prescribed at  
 3 St Thomas' Hospital treatment in relation to the HIV,  
 4 AZT.  
 5 **A. Yes. Up until then, up until the day we went to the**  
 6 **hospital, S was still fine, he was still quite chubby,**  
 7 **he had energy, he used to play cricket, but we went up**  
 8 **for one of our normal appointments.**  
 9 **They took S to do his bloods because each time**  
 10 **we went up there they had blood tests done, and the**  
 11 **doctor took me to another room and he said there was**  
 12 **a problem with S's white T cell count and there was**  
 13 **something wrong with it. So he was going to start him**  
 14 **on something they called AZT to help it, which they**  
 15 **did.**  
 16 Q. Just pausing there, Mrs C, were you told anything  
 17 about any side effects or risks or disadvantages to  
 18 the AZT treatment?  
 19 **A. No, I was just told this will help his T cell count.**  
 20 Q. What actually did happen in terms of S's physical  
 21 condition after that?  
 22 **A. Not long after, I would say about a month to six**  
 23 **weeks, you noticed there was a difference in S. He**  
 24 **seemed to stop growing. He lost a lot of weight. He**  
 25 **got thrush. Then he started getting ulcers in his**

17

1 mouth. We used to go to Guy's Hospital there and the  
2 dentist there used to try and -- his gums used to  
3 bleed. He was like a different person, to be honest.

4 The ulcers in his mouth got really bad and  
5 eventually they went down in his stomach and his  
6 bottom. In the end they started giving him steroids.  
7 They said that would help the ulcers. S apparently  
8 had a TB, which we were told it wasn't the sort of TB  
9 we would get, it was a TB that people with HIV got.  
10 He -- everything, actually, that happened to S, it was  
11 always the same thing: it wasn't what we would get; it  
12 was what people with HIV got.

13 But the ulcers were a big problem. They gave  
14 him steroids. It then started that he couldn't eat.  
15 Eventually somebody from Guy's said just give him  
16 a bit -- he was absolutely fantastic. He said he  
17 would find something to be able to put on S's mouth so  
18 that he could eat and he brought a thick paste that S  
19 could put on his mouth so he could manage to eat.

20 By this time S was getting quite paranoid. He  
21 used to love his food and he was documenting  
22 everything down, when he could drink, he was so proud  
23 when he could drink or he could eat anything.

24 They took a part of his tongue away for a biopsy  
25 to find out why but we didn't get any answers back for

19

1 **A. I don't think it had. I don't know. I think it just**  
2 **hurried it along because previous to that he had been**  
3 **fine.**

4 Q. You said in your statement that you feel that S was  
5 used as a guinea pig by the hospital for AZT?

6 **A. I do.**

7 Q. Why is that?

8 **A. I think it was because it was -- S, it happened in**  
9 **early days. I don't think actually they knew -- don't**  
10 **get me wrong, I'm not blaming the doctor at all for**  
11 **that. Dr O'Doherty was brilliant. I don't think**  
12 **actually at that point they knew what to do. So**  
13 **I think that was just given to S.**

14 I later found out that AZT actually isn't very  
15 good on its own. It needs to go with a combination of  
16 things. S wasn't given that. He was just given AZT.

17 Q. Your other son wasn't given AZT at all?

18 **A. No.**

19 Q. And didn't develop any of these problems?

20 **A. No.**

21 Q. So in January of 1994, S's condition worsened?

22 **A. It did.**

23 Q. He became very ill indeed. You described his  
24 paranoia. His weight went down to about 5 stone?

25 **A. It was, yes.**

18

1 that one. I think at that point it got too late.  
2 About two weeks before S died, he was watching  
3 something on the TV and it was a lady and her husband  
4 had been having AZT and she said that before he  
5 started having AZT he had been fine but once he  
6 started having AZT all these problems come.

7 When I went up to the hospital, S gave me  
8 a letter and he said to me don't read it there, wait  
9 until I go home. So I went home and read the letter,  
10 and he was terrified. He said he'd seen this on the  
11 news and he knew that he was having AZT.

12 So I went back to the hospital and then asked to  
13 speak to the doctor. When he come, he -- well, what  
14 he said was in the beginning when they give S the AZT  
15 it was working but it wasn't working now, so they'd  
16 stop him taking it.

17 I went along with it because to be honest it  
18 gave S a little bit of relief because he was so  
19 frightened. In my head, I didn't believe it because  
20 from when S started taking the AZT, that was when all  
21 his problems started. They stopped his AZT then but  
22 that was just two weeks before he died.

23 Q. When you say you didn't believe it, you didn't believe  
24 that the AZT had been working and had now stopped.  
25 You didn't think it had ever been working?

20

1 Q. As well as the ulcers he started getting bad chest,  
2 coughing and stomach pains?

3 **A. He was. He was in a lot of pain. He was having a lot**  
4 **of morphine. At one point, because the morphine used**  
5 **to make him sleep, they tried to bring it down a bit.**  
6 **He was so frightened of that because he used to argue**  
7 **with them because he was, I think the pain was too**  
8 **much. It was awful.**

9 He was just -- I don't know. The days when he  
10 could even just eat one thing made him so happy and  
11 that's all he used to wish for, that when -- he used  
12 to love actually Kentucky chicken and chips and he  
13 used to say that when he was better he would go and --  
14 that's the first thing he's going to have. He used to  
15 like cappuccinos. We used to take him down to the  
16 canteen but he couldn't ever drink them.

17 They used to give him in the end some -- it  
18 was -- I think, it was called Ensure. They used to  
19 freeze it for him because then he could just hold it  
20 in his mouth a bit, because his mouth was so sore.  
21 Even to the extent of -- he couldn't go to the toilet  
22 a lot and they'd give him an enema. My poor boy used  
23 to like having that done because it gave him some  
24 relief.

25 Q. You found -- we will talk about his diaries in

21

- 1 a little while but one of the things he recorded in  
2 his diaries was that he would be happy on the days he  
3 could go to the toilet because it would stop the pain  
4 and discomfort?  
5 **A. Yes. He used to feel so bunged up, that was his words  
6 that he used to use.**  
7 Q. Even once the AZT was stopped a few weeks before he  
8 died he was still being prescribed the steroids?  
9 **A. Yes.**  
10 Q. He had to take iron tablets because of his anaemia?  
11 **A. Yes.**  
12 Q. And morphine for the pain, and you described how he  
13 was frightened of that being reduced because he didn't  
14 want the pain.  
15 **A. No.**  
16 Q. So he was taking, even without the AZT, 12 to 13  
17 tablets daily at that point.  
18 **A. Yes.**  
19 Q. The ulcers had spread down from the mouth to his  
20 stomach --  
21 **A. Stomach, yes.**  
22 Q. -- you were told and the doctors wanted to start  
23 radiation therapy on the ulcers?  
24 **A. Yes.**  
25 Q. S came home from the hospital for a weekend on

- 1 **So I had to wake one of my elder sons up to look  
2 after the children and I got a minicab up to the  
3 hospital. When I got there, as I said, it just looked  
4 like S was sleeping with a sheet over him. I didn't  
5 know what my husband saw at that time. And even then,  
6 it's stupid --**  
7 Q. It's not stupid.  
8 **A. -- but I thought it was a mistake. I sat there with  
9 him and I was holding his hand and I thought in  
10 a minute he'll wake up and that's how he was. But  
11 then I felt the nurse kept coming in and then she said  
12 that she had to do the room ready for the day staff to  
13 start, but even in my head I'm thinking why is she  
14 saying that for? I didn't want to go but then my  
15 husband said to me we'd better go because they -- and  
16 when I come out, I saw Chris. She was one of the  
17 ladies that was with Dr O'Doherty and all I could say  
18 to her was why? She said to me she didn't know. And  
19 we went home.**  
20 **We were told that we could go to the haemophilia  
21 centre on the Monday and then I could go and see S in  
22 the chapel of rest. So we got up and we went there in  
23 the morning but when we went in the door, Dr Savidge  
24 met us and his words to us was we didn't really need  
25 to keep coming up the hospital now.**

22

- 1 16 February?  
2 **A. That's right, yes, and he had to go back on the 17th.**  
3 Q. I think he was quite chatty?  
4 **A. He was.**  
5 Q. That visit home?  
6 **A. That visit home he was very chatty. I've never heard  
7 him chat so much.**  
8 Q. He was talking about the new baby?  
9 **A. Yes, and that when the baby got bigger and he's got  
10 his job he was going to get everything for him.**  
11 Q. And then you took him back to hospital on 17 February  
12 for the radiation to begin?  
13 **A. Yes. We left him in the evening time. He was fine.  
14 My baby was three weeks old at the time and we'd gone  
15 up to bed, and then in the early hours of the morning  
16 we got a phone call and my husband answered it and the  
17 nurse said that S wanted us to go up there. So he  
18 just said to him, we'll be there at 9 o'clock in the  
19 morning and she said, "Oh, okay", and he put the phone  
20 down.**  
21 **Half-an-hour later the phone rung again. When  
22 my husband answered it she said I think you'd better  
23 come up now. So he went up to the hospital and I got  
24 a phone call. It was my husband. When he got there S  
25 had just died.**

24

- 1 **To me, that was telling me S had gone. They  
2 didn't have to worry anymore. So I said that we could  
3 go and see S but we needed somebody to take us down to  
4 the chapel of rest because you can't just go down  
5 there yourself, so somebody took us down there and we  
6 went and saw S down there.**  
7 **They did say to me about the funeral parlour to  
8 go to, because they said there'd been a few families,  
9 that some funeral parlours won't let you view them, so  
10 sent me to somewhere where they'd said he's quite  
11 nice. In a way, we was lucky because when I got  
12 there, I didn't know but when we did get there, the  
13 man that run it was the headmaster from my children's  
14 school from before so he knew us and he was -- he used  
15 to let us go up everyday to see S. Actually, I think  
16 it was him that got us through that time.**  
17 Q. At the point when S died he was 15 years old.  
18 **A. He was 15, yes.**  
19 Q. You provided the Inquiry with a copy of S's death  
20 certificate.  
21 Paul, it's 2687005.  
22 If we see in cause of death this doesn't mention  
23 anything about HIV or AIDS.  
24 **A. No.**  
25 Q. Was that at your request?

25

- 1 **A. No, it wasn't. I did wonder why it wasn't but, no, it**  
 2 **wasn't.**  
 3 Q. That can go down, thanks.  
 4 After S died you discovered he had been keeping  
 5 a diary?  
 6 **A. Yes.**  
 7 Q. You've shared with us some of the front pages of the  
 8 diary.  
 9 **A. Yes.**  
 10 Q. We're going to put that up. If you need it taken  
 11 down, we will.  
 12 2687002, please, Paul.  
 13 That's one of the diaries S kept.  
 14 **A. Yes.**  
 15 Q. He liked to put pictures on and you've said he was  
 16 meticulous in the way in which he wrote and drew?  
 17 **A. Very, very.**  
 18 Q. Your statement talks about some of the things he put  
 19 in his diary. Do you want to share any of them or  
 20 would you like me to or we can just leave that?  
 21 **A. I'd like you to.**  
 22 Q. Okay. So you've told us in your witness statement  
 23 some of the things that S put in his diary. He wrote  
 24 about how he was feeling, his views about the  
 25 treatment he was receiving, the pain he was in, his

- 1 basically all about me. Inside you'll see a lot of my  
 2 likes and dislikes, my wishes and dreams."  
 3 Also it says:  
 4 "How I feel on certain days and any worries  
 5 I had."  
 6 We see the date on which it is started,  
 7 8 February 1994, "finish when all the pages run out."  
 8 **A. Yes.**  
 9 Q. He wasn't able to finish it.  
 10 **A. No, he wasn't.**  
 11 Q. Because he died very soon after that.  
 12 **A. Yes.**  
 13 Q. Thank you for sharing that with us.  
 14 **A. Thank you.**  
 15 Q. Can I just ask you a little bit about S the boy, the  
 16 things he loved?  
 17 **A. He was a very strong Liverpool supporter.**  
 18 Q. Yes.  
 19 **A. He loved playing on his games. He was a very chatty**  
 20 **boy. He wasn't shy or anything like that. I think**  
 21 **him and his sister used to have arguments a bit but,**  
 22 **other than that, no, he was beautiful.**  
 23 **Coming to the end before he died he started**  
 24 **getting quite angry, which I can understand. It was**  
 25 **mainly aimed at me. I was very confused about that.**

26

- 1 aspirations for the future, about how he'd look after  
 2 your new baby when he was older and better and how the  
 3 baby would want for nothing. You've described how the  
 4 diaries were very neatly and carefully written. He  
 5 was very tidy. He wrapped everything in tissue. He  
 6 recorded his thoughts and feelings about his illness.  
 7 That's where he wrote he'd noticed how he was  
 8 treated different because you were very protective of  
 9 him.  
 10 **A. Yes.**  
 11 Q. He also wrote that he used to lock himself in the  
 12 toilets at the hospital when he was in pain because he  
 13 didn't want anyone to know. He wrote on the cover of  
 14 one book that he'd carry on writing in his book until  
 15 the pages ran out?  
 16 **A. Yes.**  
 17 Q. He wrote about a future event he was hoping to go to  
 18 in Planet Hollywood and his future ambitions and he  
 19 wrote down events such as your wedding anniversary?  
 20 **A. Yes.**  
 21 Q. We'll just have one more document, please, on screen,  
 22 Paul. It is 2687003.  
 23 We can see S's meticulous handwriting, as you  
 24 describe it:  
 25 "My feelings and my life. This book is

- 1 **His aunties used to go up and he was totally different**  
 2 **but with me he got very angry but when I asked**  
 3 **Dr O'Doherty what was the matter, he said that's**  
 4 **probably when these things happen they tend to get**  
 5 **angry with the ones they loved the most, but he was**  
 6 **just lovely.**  
 7 Q. He loved Christmas you said?  
 8 **A. He loved Christmas. He loved Christmas and he loved**  
 9 **going on holidays.**  
 10 Q. And he loved school. He was a very hard worker at  
 11 school you described.  
 12 **A. He loved school. We only found this out after he'd**  
 13 **died. He was in hospital quite a lot in the last year**  
 14 **and he was due to do his exams and he was very keen on**  
 15 **doing his exams. I'm not just saying it because he**  
 16 **was my son but he was very bright. We found it hard**  
 17 **because we wanted to get some work to the hospital so**  
 18 **he could keep up because he was getting ready for his**  
 19 **exams but the school wasn't sending them. In the end**  
 20 **the hospital had to intervene and they started sending**  
 21 **him some stuff. But it was later, after he died, he**  
 22 **used to keep all his papers, his Dad had given him**  
 23 **a Glenfiddich tin. It was like a tube and he used to**  
 24 **keep all his papers in there, but apparently -- S had**  
 25 **gone very small. He actually was quite tiny compared**

1 to the other children of his age then and we found out  
2 he was being bullied, that somebody used to meet him  
3 at the gate and take his money off him and if he  
4 had -- S had a certain pen, apparently a teacher had  
5 told him it was really good to help with his  
6 handwriting, so S had got this pen and the boy took it  
7 away from him.

8 As he said, it wasn't just because it was a pen  
9 but it was because the teacher had said to him it  
10 would help him, he wanted it and he just used to want  
11 to -- he said he wouldn't even have minded if they  
12 took him into a room and let him be on his own. He  
13 just wanted to do his work. He used to set everything  
14 out, but this boy, obviously because S was smaller, he  
15 took advantage of him and we heard -- what he said was  
16 he just wanted to be left alone so he could do his  
17 schoolwork but we didn't find any of this out because  
18 he never told us. We didn't find this out until after  
19 he'd died and we looked through his diary.

20 Q. You discovered only years after S had died that he'd  
21 also been diagnosed with hepatitis C.

22 A. I didn't find that out until 2009.

23 Q. How did you find that out?

24 A. We used to have the Macfarlane Trust but after S died,  
25 all that, we didn't get any more correspondence from

31

1 out?

2 A. Yes.

3 Q. You'd kept what had happened to S from anyone other  
4 than the very close members of your family.

5 A. I didn't even tell my younger children. When S died  
6 I told them that he had a rare form of cancer because  
7 that's what I was told his ulcers were. It wasn't  
8 a cancer that we could get, once again it was just  
9 something that somebody with HIV got, so that is what  
10 I told my children. My older children were aware but  
11 not my younger ones.

12 Q. One of the reasons you'd not wanted to talk about it  
13 more widely was because of the stigma associated with  
14 HIV and AIDS and one of the phrases you have used in  
15 your witness statement is not wanting to feel like  
16 a leper?

17 A. That's right. When S -- when I first heard about S's  
18 HIV, a few weeks later I was reading a paper and it  
19 always sticks in my mind. There was a reporter for  
20 the paper and what he said was everybody with HIV they  
21 should be put on an island and left there, and  
22 I remember sitting there thinking how can they say  
23 something like that. My children have got HIV and  
24 they're just little children. How can you say  
25 something like that? So actually I didn't feel like

30

1 them.

2 Then 2009 apparently The Skipton Trust had taken  
3 over from the Macfarlane Trust at some point. They  
4 just sent -- it was just a normal letter thing saying  
5 that the people that had got hepatitis C and the ones  
6 that had died there was I think they called it  
7 a something payment. So I contacted them and I said  
8 that actually I wasn't aware that S had got hepatitis  
9 C because I'd never been told that. So I had to phone  
10 up the hospital and the nurse said she was going to go  
11 and try and find his records to have a look, and then  
12 when I phoned back the next day that is when she said  
13 that he had had hepatitis C but then she said she  
14 wasn't surprised because the two brothers they had the  
15 same, but I hadn't -- previous to that I wasn't made  
16 aware of that.

17 Q. So you had never been told that he was being tested  
18 for hepatitis C?

19 A. No.

20 Q. Or given your consent to that?

21 A. No.

22 Q. And you had never been told the outcome of any tests?

23 A. No.

24 Q. It was years after he died when you got this letter  
25 out of the blue from The Skipton Fund that you found

1 I wanted to tell my younger children that. I didn't  
2 want to put them through that.

3 Q. In fact, subsequently, one of your other children was  
4 told at St Thomas', by a doctor treating him that S  
5 had had HIV and AIDS and had died as a result?

6 A. Yes.

7 Q. That was without your knowledge and consent?

8 A. No, I didn't know until my son come home and he said  
9 to me he didn't -- what was this about, he didn't  
10 know.

11 Q. And your daughter?

12 A. My daughter was told first. She had gone for an  
13 appointment to my GP and the GP had told her. So she  
14 come told and me the same thing up but until then they  
15 didn't know.

16 Q. Has anyone ever offered you or any of your family  
17 members testing for HIV or HCV over the years? Did  
18 they ever offer that?

19 A. No.

20 Q. Did they ever offer you any support or counselling?

21 A. No.

22 Q. You have mentioned the Macfarlane Trust?

23 A. Yes.

24 Q. You received some money from the Macfarlane Trust  
25 while S was alive which you accepted in particular

- 1 because you wanted to take him on holiday?
- 2 **A. In the beginning, I think it must have been round**
- 3 **about 1988, we received a letter and it was, I think,**
- 4 **like a solicitor's letter and it was saying that they**
- 5 **were going to be given this money but we had to sign**
- 6 **a form.**
- 7 **We were advised to sign it because they told us**
- 8 **we couldn't fight the Government; so it would be best**
- 9 **just to take it, which we did. Then the**
- 10 **Macfarlane Trust was set up and they used to give**
- 11 **I think it was £230 a month for S and that went on**
- 12 **until S died. He died on 18 February in the early**
- 13 **hours of the morning and I got a letter, the last**
- 14 **letter I ever got from the Macfarlane Trust was on the**
- 15 **19th. They sent and they told me that they were sorry**
- 16 **to hear about S dying and they put in a cheque for**
- 17 **£1,000 to help with his funeral costs.**
- 18 **I did not actually get how they knew but then**
- 19 **when I said to Chris, she said that she has to inform**
- 20 **them when this happens and that was the last time**
- 21 **I heard from them after that.**
- 22 Q. You've said in your statement how none of this has
- 23 ever gone away from your mind?
- 24 **A. No.**
- 25 Q. You tried to push it away. You have said the Inquiry

- 2 Q. Thank you.
- 3 **A. Thank you.**
- 4 **SIR BRIAN LANGSTAFF:** I think you have indeed got S's
- 5 story out there.
- 6 **A. Thank you.**
- 7 **SIR BRIAN LANGSTAFF:** Well done.
- 8 **A. Thank you.**
