3 **SIR BRIAN LANGSTAFF:** Our next witness is Michelle, is it?

4 **MS FRASER BUTLIN:** That's correct, sir.

5 **SIR BRIAN LANGSTAFF:** Michelle.

6 **MICHELLE BAKER, affirmed**

7 **Questioned by MS FRASER BUTLIN**

8 **Q.** Michelle, you met your late husband Vincent in 1999?

9 **A. Yes.**

10 **Q.** You have got a photo of him you'd like to have on

11 screen while you're giving your evidence. Just to

12 explain, we've just received the photograph and we've

13 redacted the faces of your daughters because we don't

14 have explicit consent from them to show their faces

15 for today because we've just got it, okay?

16 **A. Yes.**

17 **Q.** We can see Vincent there in the photo.

18 Before you met, Vincent was involved in

19 a motorbike accident?

20 **SIR BRIAN LANGSTAFF:** Is there any way that we can portray

21 the picture without the big blank white bit in the

22 middle?

23 **MS FRASER BUTLIN:** Sir, this is the first time I've seen

24 it redacted and it's not ideal --

25 **SIR BRIAN LANGSTAFF:** Thank you.

1 **A. Yes. Yes, we had our family holidays camping down in**

2 **Cornwall, yes, weekend family things.**

3 **Q.** Just ordinary day-to-day life together.

4 **A. Yes.**

5 **Q.** What changed in 2008?

6 **A. He just started getting quite ill. His skin started**

7 **getting quite thin. The slightest knock he used to**

8 **start bleeding. He did start drinking. Then admitted**

9 **he was an alcoholic and went to the doctor's to get**

10 **help from that, from which he did give up drinking, he**

11 **gave up smoking when he realised that he had problems**

12 **with his liver but at that point we didn't realise it**

13 **was HCV.**

14 **He got, yeah, they all presumed it was just the**

15 **alcohol from the liver, cirrhosis of the liver.**

16 **Q.** Let's take the in stages. 2008 to 2009 Vincent just

17 wasn't well?

18 **A. No.**

19 **Q.** You have said his skin kept bleeding with the

20 slightest knock.

21 **A. Yes.**

22 **Q.** He kept getting infections.

23 **A. Infections, yes.**

24 **Q.** So he would go on to some antibiotics.

25 **A. Antibiotics, yes, backwards and forwards from the**

1 **MS FRASER BUTLIN:** Thank you, Paul. Before you met

2 Vincent was involved in a motorbike accident. What do

3 you know about that?

4 **A. Not a lot, really. I just know he was in hospital for**

5 **about six months. He fractured -- well, broke his leg**

6 **and he got given four units of blood.**

7 **Q.** That accident was on 11 March 1983?

8 **A. Yes.**

9 **Q.** He was put in traction, as you say. He was in

10 hospital for about four or six months before returning

11 home.

12 **A. Yes.**

13 **Q.** It was during that stay that he was infected with

14 hepatitis C from a blood transfusion?

15 **A. Yes.**

16 **Q.** Can you tell us what Vincent was like.

17 **A. Happy-go-lucky, adored his children, loved his car**

18 **boot sales, a very family-orientated man, loved his**

19 **Mum and Dad to death, hard working.**

20 **Q.** You had three children together?

21 **A. Yes, three children.**

22 **Q.** Until 2008 Vincent was well.

23 **A. Yes.**

24 **Q.** As far as you were concerned, it was a normal family

25 life together?

1 **hospital, having endoscopies to see what was going on**

2 **inside. His stomach kept bloating out. I can't**

3 **remember what they call it now. He had to have that**

4 **drained. Must have had that drained about four times,**

5 **I think.**

6 **Q.** In 2009 Vincent was diagnosed with cirrhosis of the

7 liver and was told it was probably caused by alcohol?

8 **A. Yes.**

9 **Q.** In your statement, you disputed that Vincent was

10 a heavy drinker and Dr Li has responded to your

11 statement and highlighted a number of medical records

12 from different doctors saying that Vincent was

13 drinking heavily.

14 **A. Yes.**

15 **Q.** You have reflected and you accept that Vincent was

16 drinking heavily and, as you said, was an alcoholic

17 but only from about 2006 and he'd stop drinking by

18 Christmas 2008?

19 **A. Yes.**

20 **Q.** Is that right?

21 **A. Yes, that's correct.**

22 **Q.** So although he had been drinking it had only been for

23 a couple of years, it hadn't been for the decades that

24 the doctors seemed to be suggesting.

25 **A. No. I mean, obviously prior weekend drinking, sort of**

- 1 **thing, as any young person does but not to the extent**
 2 **that he did build up to.**
 3 **Q.** Then Christmas 2008 you're clear that he stopped
 4 drinking.
 5 **A. Yes.**
 6 **Q.** Vincent worked as a long distance lorry driver --
 7 **A. Yes.**
 8 **Q.** -- during this time and he was involved in an accident
 9 in August 2009. Can you tell us what happened.
 10 **A. Well, he used to deliver operating tables, actually,**
 11 **to hospitals. He lost consciousness at the wheel and**
 12 **ended up going into the back of another car, got taken**
 13 **into the hospital. I had a phone call saying that he**
 14 **had been involved in an RTA and it was really, really**
 15 **serious. So I phoned his Dad and his Dad and myself**
 16 **drove up there to Sandwell Hospital.**
 17 **I can just remember walking in there and he was in**
 18 **his bed and the priest was standing over him because**
 19 **they didn't think he was going to survive it, and it**
 20 **was at that point that the doctor there confirmed that**
 21 **he was hepatitis C positive and I just remember the**
 22 **shock because we didn't realise that before.**
 23 **Q.** When he was in hospital in Manchester, at that point
 24 in time you were told that he had hepatitis C and that
 25 it was likely the cause of the cirrhosis of the liver.

- 1 for me ..."
 2 Have you ever seen this document before?
 3 **A. No.**
 4 **Q.** Despite asking for Vincent's medical records, until
 5 Dr Li provided this letter you weren't aware that this
 6 is what had happened?
 7 **A. No, no.**
 8 **Q.** Dr Li, we know from the documents he has provided to
 9 us, then escalated the issue and raised an incident
 10 report about it with the hospital but you remain
 11 concerned that the hospital had failed to pass on the
 12 result to Dr Li.
 13 **A. Yes, if they knew in February, we didn't find out**
 14 **until April after the RTA accident, where was that**
 15 **piece of paper? Surely they should have informed**
 16 **Dr Li about it straight away as soon as they had the**
 17 **results.**
 18 **Q.** Your concern is that if Vincent had been told that he
 19 had hepatitis C in February 2009 when the test result
 20 came back, you are concerned that he could have had
 21 treatment and wouldn't have died.
 22 **A. That is a good possibility. It's just what if. We'll**
 23 **never know.**
 24 **Q.** Dr Li has responded and said that Vincent was too
 25 unwell to receive the antiviral drugs, even when he

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- 1 **A. Yes.**
 2 **Q.** That was the first time you were aware that Vincent
 3 had hepatitis C?
 4 **A. Yes.**
 5 **Q.** In your statement you've said that you were upset that
 6 Dr Li hadn't told Vincent he had hepatitis C.
 7 **A. Yes.**
 8 **Q.** Dr Li has responded to your witness statement and said
 9 there was an error in the hospital systems, so he
 10 never knew about the result of the hepatitis C test
 11 that he'd ordered.
 12 **A. No, according to his statement, because at the time**
 13 **I didn't know that but I couldn't understand how come**
 14 **Sandwell Hospital picked up on it and Worthing**
 15 **Hospital didn't, even though Vincent had been to the**
 16 **hospital numerous times prior to that.**
 17 **Q.** If we can have document 3175015, please, it's a letter
 18 from Dr Li saying:
 19 "Please could you let me know if Mr Baker is
 20 hepatitis C positive. I've heard from two separate
 21 sources, i.e. his GP and a hospital in Birmingham
 22 called Sandwell Hospital, that he's positive. I have
 23 yet to receive a report of this and I can't find any
 24 record of the result being filed in the notes.
 25 I would be very grateful if you could look into this

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- 1 was seen in February 2009 because he needed treatment
 2 of the ascites and the variceal haemorrhage at that
 3 point. Again, what is your response to that?
 4 **A. But what if? You just don't know. Like that three**
 5 **months, all right it's only three months, but that**
 6 **three months could have saved his life or he could**
 7 **have had the treatment or had his liver transplant**
 8 **earlier but it's just the not knowing.**
 9 **Q.** After Vincent had received treatment for the varices
 10 and the ascites, Vincent was referred to King's
 11 College London for assessment for a transplant.
 12 **A. Yes.**
 13 **Q.** Could we have document 3175011, please. It's the
 14 second and third paragraphs of the letter. Thank you.
 15 He doesn't have any major contraindications for
 16 consideration of transplantation at that stage in
 17 August 2009, but if we look at paragraph 3 there were
 18 some concerns about his heart condition and whether he
 19 would be suitable or not.
 20 Do you remember that discussion?
 21 **A. I can remember going up to King's College and --**
 22 **because he reached the top of the list and thinking he**
 23 **was going to go ahead with the liver transplant but,**
 24 **unfortunately, because of his heart failure it was**
 25 **just too risky for them to operate, so he got sent**

1 **back to Worthing Hospital.**
 2 **Q.** We can see at the end of that letter that there was
 3 a discussion about whether he would have the PEGylated
 4 interferon as well but it was subject to, again,
 5 further investigation of his heart condition.
 6 If we can then go to 1825002, please, and the
 7 fourth page which should be a letter dated
 8 22 February 2010. I think it's the next page, Paul.
 9 It's a letter from King's Hospital to the GP and
 10 if we go down towards the end there's a useful summary
 11 of his medical history noting that he had been seen at
 12 King's College Hospital in 2009 where he was
 13 considered for transplantation work up. That was in
 14 August 2009 and at that time the only issues
 15 prohibiting him from listing was of ST depression
 16 identified on a CPEX testing. That's his heart
 17 condition. He had then undergone an angiogram in
 18 October 2009 which delineated no significant coronary
 19 artery disease.
 20 So in October 2009, as you say, he had gone on to
 21 the liver transplant list and it looked very much like
 22 he was going to have a transplant?
 23 **A. Yes.**
 24 **Q.** Unfortunately, Vincent became very unwell shortly
 25 afterwards. Do you remember what happened?

1 **A. What, from King's College?**
 2 **Q.** Yes, from October 2009. He had a heart condition.
 3 **A. Yes, I just know he got sent back to Worthing. He was**
 4 **constantly at Worthing Hospital. He kept getting**
 5 **infections, getting confused, tried to escape from the**
 6 **hospital once and the police had to bring him back.**
 7 **He just sort of went downhill.**
 8 **Q.** He had two episodes of a very serious heart valve
 9 infection called infective endocarditis, didn't he?
 10 He had a really nasty infections.
 11 **A. Yes.**
 12 **Q.** We can see if we go back to the letter we were just
 13 looking at, when he was seen at King's, here at the
 14 last paragraph of the letter, he's now a Child's B/C
 15 cirrhotic and the fact he has had an intra-cerebral
 16 bleed in the last 24 hours an aortic valve replacement
 17 was felt to be a too high risk because of the liver
 18 and also then secondly and currently liver
 19 transplantation in the setting of acute active
 20 infection and a recent intra-cerebral haemorrhage
 21 would be totally contraindicated.
 22 So by the time he was seen here in King's there
 23 were just too many things going on for Vincent,
 24 weren't there, for him to be either have a heart
 25 operation or to have his liver transplant.

1 **A. Yes.**
 2 **Q.** So as you say he was transferred back to Worthing for
 3 palliative care.
 4 **A. Yes.**
 5 **Q.** That was your understanding at the time?
 6 **A. Yes.**
 7 **Q.** From August 2009 Vincent was mostly in hospital
 8 because you weren't able to manage him at home.
 9 Can you tell us a little bit of how Vincent was
 10 physically and mentally in those last few months.
 11 **A. Physically there was nothing of him. He'd just lost**
 12 **so much weight. He was all skin and bone. Mentally,**
 13 **he was confused. He turned nasty towards the family.**
 14 **He stopped having treatment because he knew that he**
 15 **wasn't going to last much longer. It wasn't him, no.**
 16 **Q.** You have given some examples in your statement, one of
 17 them was when he'd ordered something from the internet
 18 and missed the parcel delivery. Can you tell us about
 19 that.
 20 **A. Yes, he ordered something. Yes, he was asleep when**
 21 **the delivery come, so he decided rather than wait for**
 22 **the next day he decided that he wanted to go up to**
 23 **Crawley to go and pick it up. I told him that he**
 24 **wasn't in no fit state to drive the car but I couldn't**
 25 **argue with him, sort of thing. He got in the car. He**

1 **was meant to go from Brighton to Crawley. He ended up**
 2 **down in Hastings in a ditch in a tree and he phoned me**
 3 **up and he says, "I don't know what I'm doing. I can't**
 4 **move the car", but because he was on the stump of**
 5 **a tree and then the police come and found him.**
 6 **Q.** That was one of the few times he was home in that
 7 period?
 8 **A. Yes.**
 9 **Q.** Then in the later stages of his illness he realised
 10 nothing could be done for him and he phoned you quite
 11 regularly.
 12 **A. Yes.**
 13 **Q.** What did he tell you?
 14 **A. Can you read that.**
 15 **Q.** Of course.
 16 "He sometimes expressed the fact that there was
 17 nothing that could be done in strange ways such as
 18 phoning me and telling me he was having affairs in an
 19 effort to make me angry at him so I'd be less
 20 distressed when he passed away."
 21 Vincent died on 20 March 2010. Can you tell us
 22 a little bit about the impact and the effect of his
 23 death on you.
 24 **A. It was very hard. Hard on the kids. Obviously, they**
 25 **didn't have their Dad no more.**

- 1 Q. They were just 9, 7 and 5 --
- 2 A. **5, yes.**
- 3 Q. -- when he died.
- 4 A. **Yes, my older two not too bad, my younger one it's**
- 5 **affected her quite a bit. She was Daddy's girl, sort**
- 6 **of thing. Yeah, no, it's been a struggle with the**
- 7 **girls.**
- 8 Q. For you you've had to become a single Mum with your
- 9 girls?
- 10 A. **Yes, my three girls.**
- 11 Q. And you have other caring responsibilities you are
- 12 shouldering on your own.
- 13 A. **Yes, at that point I took on my two brothers that were**
- 14 **21 years younger than me, they're twins. One of**
- 15 **them's [redacted] so I'm his carer. Yeah, I was just**
- 16 **looking after all five of them and trying to work and**
- 17 **keep the house going.**
- 18 Q. You have said to me that the girls now are still in
- 19 education. They're only in their teenage years.
- 20 A. **Yes.**
- 21 Q. Two of them have been okay but the little one has had
- 22 quite considerable mental health difficulties.
- 23 A. **Yes, yeah.**
- 24 Q. Financially -- sorry, before we go there, while
- 25 Vincent was ill, how much did your daughters know

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- 1 **"Don't use his toothbrush because you will get it",**
- 2 **sort of thing. Yes, of course, touching the blood**
- 3 **I used to touch his wounds all the time, clean him up,**
- 4 **put his dressings on sort of thing and like I didn't**
- 5 **think nothing. I was just doing the wifely thing,**
- 6 **looking after him.**
- 7 Q. Your feeling about the family was they were trying to
- 8 helpful but actually for you it was just too hard?
- 9 A. **No, it was the opposite. That's the worst thing you**
- 10 **can actually do is Google. I've learnt that.**
- 11 Q. Financially things have been difficult for you as
- 12 well. You stopped a part-time job in November 2009
- 13 when Vincent also stopped work?
- 14 A. **That's when I started.**
- 15 Q. Sorry, apologies, that's when you started. Can you
- 16 tell us about that?
- 17 A. **Yes, because after Vincent's accident, he realised**
- 18 **that he couldn't actually go back to work because of**
- 19 **everything that was going on; so he actually resigned**
- 20 **from his job because he thought it was unfair on them.**
- 21 **So of course we went on benefits then, but then**
- 22 **I managed to find a part-time job at the school**
- 23 **running the kitchens and thought it was a bit of an**
- 24 **income, the girls were at the school as well, so it**
- 25 **just worked.**

- 1 about it?
- 2 A. **At first I think they just grew into it was an**
- 3 **everyday thing but the more he deteriorated I didn't**
- 4 **want the girls seeing their Dad this way and losing**
- 5 **his way and not being him, as I said because of his**
- 6 **confused state from the infections and I took them to**
- 7 **see him but not as much. Over time, it just got less**
- 8 **sort of thing because I didn't feel it was the right**
- 9 **place to take three girls in hospital.**
- 10 Q. What do they remember of their Dad?
- 11 A. **Well, they got their photographs. They just remember**
- 12 **Chessington, Pontlands Park, not quite so much**
- 13 **Cornwall, not my younger one, but no, they just**
- 14 **remember playing with him in the garden.**
- 15 Q. But once he was ill you have said in your statement
- 16 that they don't really remember him, apart from the
- 17 fact that he was in and out of hospital.
- 18 A. **Yeah, they don't -- no, they can't recall how serious**
- 19 **he was sort of thing. I didn't feel it was the right**
- 20 **place to keep taking the girls, even though, yeah, it**
- 21 **was their Dad but the way he was, no.**
- 22 Q. You have said that when the family knew about your
- 23 husband having hepatitis C they Googled it and what
- 24 did they say to you?
- 25 A. **Well, his uncle, he turned round and said to me,**

- 1 Q. You have received some payments through The Skipton
- 2 Fund?
- 3 A. **Yes.**
- 4 Q. What are your views of the financial assistance that
- 5 you've been provided?
- 6 A. **It sounds a lot but it's not a lot, no, not when the**
- 7 **girls were so young. I mean, he was on a very good**
- 8 **salary, sort of thing, my youngest was five at the**
- 9 **time, sort of thing, so she's 15 now. Yes, it's been**
- 10 **hard but I've managed.**
- 11 Q. But financially it's been a struggle as the girls have
- 12 grown up?
- 13 A. **Yes. Three girls, want, want, want.**
- 14 Q. You feel that the financial assistance simply hasn't
- 15 been anywhere near enough.
- 16 A. **No.**
- 17 Q. Compared to what Vincent would have earned if he --
- 18 A. **Would have earned, he was on between £35,000 and**
- 19 **£45,000 a year sort of thing and so what they paid out**
- 20 **was a year and a half's salary, so ... we could have**
- 21 **had a house by now, bought a house. I'm still in my**
- 22 **council house, no disrespect to that. I love my house**
- 23 **sort of thing but things could have been different.**
- 24 Q. Those are the questions I have for you. Is there
- 25 anything else you would like to say?

1 **A. No.**
 2 **MS FRASER BUTLIN:** Just stay there a moment I want to ask
 3 Ms Gibbs whether there's any points she wants to
 4 raise.
 5 There's nothing Ms Gibbs wants me to raise. Sir,
 6 is there anything?
 7 **SIR BRIAN LANGSTAFF:** Yes, there is, when you first heard
 8 that Vincent had hepatitis C, were you told anything
 9 about it?
 10 **A. To be honest, I can't honestly remember because it was**
 11 **just such a shock hearing that he had that. I mean,**
 12 **Dr Li, bless him, he does us good because he managed**
 13 **to find out where he contracted it from. He went back**
 14 **through the records sort of thing but, no, I can't**
 15 **recall being told anything.**
 16 **SIR BRIAN LANGSTAFF:** Before your uncle Googled, did
 17 anyone tell you what to do to keep yourselves safe
 18 from a chance of cross-infection?
 19 **A. I can't honestly remember because so much was just**
 20 **going on. I probably got given a leaflet or something**
 21 **I just ...**
 22 **SIR BRIAN LANGSTAFF:** So somebody might have said
 23 something but you can't remember?
 24 **A. Yes.**
 25 **SIR BRIAN LANGSTAFF:** And you can't remember because of

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1 all the stress of everything that was happening?
 2 **A. Yes. Sorry.**

 6 **A. I think someone mentioned something but because I've**
 7 **had my three young girls I just focused -- they kept**
 8 **me strong. I had to stay strong for them.**
 9 **SIR BRIAN LANGSTAFF:** Do you remember who said something?
 10 **A. I can't honestly remember, as I say, because it was**
 11 **just so long ago and that sort of nine-month period**
 12 **was such a blur in and out of hospitals every day and**
 13 **like.**
 14 **SIR BRIAN LANGSTAFF:** That's all that I have to ask.
 15 Thank you very much indeed, Michelle, for coming
 16 to give us your evidence.
 17 **A. Thank you.**
 18 **SIR BRIAN LANGSTAFF:** We will take a break now, shall we,
 19 until 2 o'clock.
 20 **MS FRASER BUTLIN:** Thank you.
 21 **SIR BRIAN LANGSTAFF:** At 2 o'clock we have Peter Buckland,
 22 do we?
 23 **MS FRASER BUTLIN:** That's correct, sir, yes.
 24 **SIR BRIAN LANGSTAFF:** And tell us about vCJD?
 25 **MS FRASER BUTLIN:** That's right.
